

## 35,000 SAW THE FAIR

Western Attracted Many Thousands of Outsiders As Well As School Children.

### THREE DRIVERS WERE FINED

Starter Baker Got Tired of the Exhibition of Scoring and Put a Stop to it.

Visitors' Day at the Western Fair lived up to its reputation, and a crowd almost as large as Wednesday's saw the Western Fair on Thursday.

Altogether Wednesday and Thursday have been the two largest days the Western has yet seen, and makes it absolutely certain that the Fair will be a financial success.

The weather all week has been simply perfect, and as a result the attendance has been excellent.

Yesterday there was an enormous crowd. They started early for the Fair grounds, and from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., they poured in a continual stream to the park.

The number of children at the Fair was noticeable. The public and separate schools were closed and the youngsters took advantage of it to attend the big exhibition. They were there in large crowds and had a fine time. They were the most enthusiastic and appreciative audience of the week.

35,000 People There.

The attendance is estimated at 35,000, a trifle less than Wednesday. The grandstand both afternoon and evening was crowded to its capacity, and the visitors were given a good entertainment.

An added feature of the programme was the appearance of Hon. Adam Beck and Mrs. Beck with their string of hunters, Sir Edward, Sir Thomas, and Sir Frederick.

Jimmy Smith was mounted on the Olympian winner, Sir Edward, while

Mrs. Beck rode Sir Thomas, and Mr. Beck, Sir Frederick.

It was an excellent exhibition and pleased the crowd greatly. They were most enthusiastic when Sir Edward jumped 6 feet 8 inches, with all the grace imaginable.

Miss K. Wilks, of Galt, owner of the Cruikston farm, was a visitor and saw her horses in action. One of her favorites, Vanity Oreo, won the gentleman's wagon race, after a somewhat strenuous time, and it pleased her greatly. Her famous show winner, Mograia, also gave a fine exhibition.

The attractions were given in full, including the 91st Regiment Band. Everything moved smoothly, and everybody seemed pleased.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. J. Bland-rish, who is in charge of the fruit exhibit from British Columbia, gave an excellent address on fruit, and showed the possibilities of the great western province along these lines.

The horse races were the best of the week, and hair-line finishes marked each heat.

The gentlemen's road race for trotters was an exciting affair, and was won by Miss Wilks' Vanity Oreo, as fine a little trotter as ever looked through a bridge. There was the most tiresome lot of scoring ever seen on a London track, and Starter Baker fined three drivers \$10 each for scoring ahead of the horses.

Harry Lang took the second heat of the race with Peacemaker, a big strong horse, after the type of old Alvin. He is a green one, and should be as good as could be seen anywhere.

The other race, a three-horse affair, was always a contest, and the finishes were close.

FALLS ON A STAKE AND DIES OF INJURY

Charles Bee Meets Tragic Death While at Work Near Aylmer.

Aylmer, Ont., Sept. 15.—Charles Bee was killed near here today, while at work on a barn, through falling on a pointed stake. The stake penetrated the lining of the stomach. Bee, dying shortly after, being taken home.

Bee, who had been in this country about ten years, is survived by his wife and a seven-year-old boy. Mr. Bee is a sister of George Fisher, who was killed in the same factory explosion last fall. Bee was 35 years of age.

SENTENCED TO GALLOWES FOR KILLING CONSTABLES

Timothy Candy Makes Long Plea For Mercy, But is Unsuccessful.

Montreal, Sept. 15.—Timothy Candy was today sentenced to be hanged on Nov. 18, for the murder of Constables Fortin and O'Connor last spring.

Candy had stolen some goods from the Ames, Holden Company, where he was employed as night watchman, and when pursued by the policemen opened fire.

Before being sentenced he made a long plea for mercy, and Judge St. Pierre was greatly affected.

SPAIN ABOLISHES GALLOWES.

Madrid, Sept. 15.—In reopening the Cortes today, Ruiz Valarino, the minister of justice, announced the early abolition of the death penalty and said that numerous modifications would be adopted for the purpose of simplifying the civil and military codes.

## GLOCKING NAMED TO HEAD LABOR

The Congress Elects Him at Port Arthur Convention.

### CALGARY NEXT YEAR

Resolution to Close Bars on Labor Day Was Defeated.

Port Arthur, Sept. 15.—Wm. Glock-ing, of Toronto, was chosen president on the first ballot over James Waters, of Victoria, and James Somerville, of Moosejaw, by the Trades and Labor Congress today. R. T. Pettypiece, of Victoria, defeated Samuel Hadden, of Hamilton, for fraternal delegate. Calgary beat Guelph for the convention of 1911. Jos. Gibbons, of Toronto, urged legislation be asked for providing for centre aisles in street cars and the prohibiting of running boards.

J. H. Burnett, of Toronto, wanted better sanitary conditions in foundries. A socialist resolution, which it is expected will cause some debate, will ask for a change to the constitution which pledges the congress to public ownership of telephones, gas and electric lighting, street railways, and sub-siding instead of a pay-off provided for the co-operative working of all means of wealth, production, distribution and exchange. This is not likely to carry.

The most important subject discussed by the congress this morning was the secretary's report, which was adopted, as was the audit committee's statement, showing a balance in the bank of \$2,378.78. Dr. Shearer, of the Lord's Day Alliance, was present at today's session. Delegate Manning, from the American Federation of Labor, read a cordial address of greeting. A resolution for the closing of bars on Labor Day was withdrawn.

NEW OFFICERS WERE FORMALLY INSTALLED

Rousing Welcome Was Extended by the Officers and Staff.

Thursday night, before a very large and representative audience, the new officers of the Trades and Labor Congress were formally installed.

There were a number of speakers who have addresses, extending a very hearty welcome to the new commandants, as follows: Eugene Davis, of St. Catharines, speaking for the women officers of the division, gave her pledge that the women could be depended on and that they would look up to the officers and strive to follow out their commands, and learn the lesson that their long service entailed them to.

Captain Weeks, in voicing the feelings of the men officers, could only follow along the lines of Eugene Davis and stated that they received their new leaders right into their hearts, and could be depended on to follow out their commands. For a long time he had been a volunteer, a militiaman, and a Queen's soldier, and in these posts had learned the beauty of obedience, and as representing the soldiers of the old London I Corps, he could assure the new leaders of the utmost loyalty in following out their wishes in every matter pertaining to the extension of the kingdom. He was glad to know that they were in London, and trusted that their advent would mean many souls being saved.

Staff Captain Walton followed on behalf of the corps and officers. His welcome was hearty. He remembered the colonel for many years, and knew that in him they would have a brave and consistent leader, and he knew already what the wide-hearted welcome to London meant to him, and assured the colonel that they, as a corps and people, were one with him for the carrying out of the convictions and teachings of the army.

Mrs. Andrews then spoke a few words on behalf of the Mercy League. They were one with their leaders in pushing on the claims of the work, they knew what it was to have to hustle as well as look after homes and home interests, but they were one with them for the helping of mankind.

Working for the Master.

Mrs. Chandler was the first to make reply, which she did very gracefully, alluding to the twenty-one years which she had spent in the Salvation Army, and how nothing could ever separate her from it and its teachings. When she first joined the army it meant the

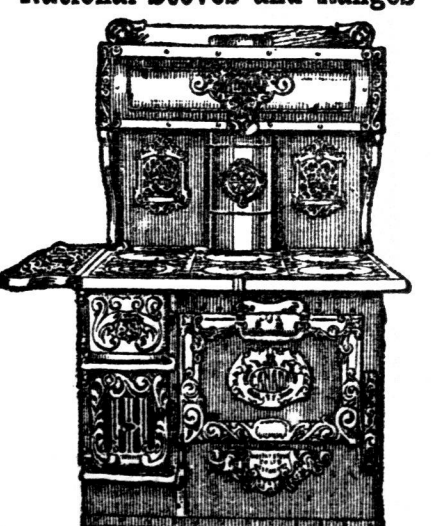
