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KEEP UP FIGHT ON FOOD PRICES

Riots in Town of Northern France Every Day.

THE TROOPS ARE STONED

Gendarmes and Mounted Troops Guard Many Cities—Police Handling the Situation in Paris.

Paris, Oct. 5.—The campaign against dear food is proceeding in the north with unabated vigor. The mayor of Roubaix has issued an order to issue an order closing the saloons at half-past 8 in the evening. There are riots in the town almost every night. Bands of stoned troops who attempt to disperse them. Barricades have been erected with paving stones, wire stretched at either side of the streets and the rioters take refuge in the yards of houses until they are dislodged by the troops. In the course of the disturbances several soldiers have been killed and many are injured. Things are in a bad way at Denain, where the mayor, who is a socialist deputy, and his assistants have been killed. In this town, besides a hundred gendarmes on duty, there are six companies of infantry, and four squadrons of mounted troops. A regiment of colonial infantry has been sent to strengthen this force.

In Lille, too, the outlook is threatening. At a meeting of 3,000 people yesterday, the police intervened and the produce of those peasants who will not conform to the tariff was passed.

At Epervier a number of market gardeners refused to unpack their vegetables and fruits. A crowd of people threatened to lay hands on the goods. The police intervened and pointed out that the market gardeners would be expelled if they did not unpack their produce.

There has been further trouble in Paris, too. As a protest against the high cost of provisions, crowds of people have invaded the markets. The police, so far, however, have been sufficiently strong to prevent riots.

In order to meet the food crisis, M. Felix Roussel, the president of the municipal council, has called together the heads of the provision departments and discussed with them the steps to be taken in view of the further increase in the prices of food products.

Tested against the proposal to establish in the communes co-operative bakeries and butcher shops—a proposal which M. Caillaux, the premier, has discussed with his ministers. The food purveyors are of opinion that far from mitigating the crisis these co-operative bakeries and butchers' shops would aggravate it.

Publish Prices Daily.

The president of the municipal council suggests that to avoid trouble the prices of provisions should be published daily, so that the public would know what articles of food had been dearer, the public could compare the published prices to ascertain that articles of food were stationary, and possibly potatoes could be replaced by rice, which has not gone up.

The food purveyors have agreed to draw up reports giving forecasts of food prices and the practical measures to be taken in view of increases.

This food movement, with all its regrettable consequences, has covered the north, the east and the centre of France, and the system is still in operation today at the Earl's Court station on the underground railway.
