BROCK CENTENARY FITTINGLY MARKED

Seventh Regiment Conducts Impressive Exercises in Front of Soldiers' Monument.

ATTEND DIVINE SERVICE

Rev. Richard Whiting, of the First Methodist Church, Speaks for Peace and Harmony in Canada.

A short but impressive ceremony was held on Sunday at noon by the Seventh Regiment, after the regiment had attended divine service at the First Methodist Church, in front of the soldiers' monument in Victoria Park, to mark the centenary of the death of Gen. Sir Isaac Brock. The men were drawn up in line in front of the monument, the officers stood at attention, while the band played "O Canada," and the "National Anthem." This concluded the regimental parade to the anniversary. The church parade was one of the best yet held by the regiment. It was practically up to full strength, and nearly all the officers were in attendance. In addition to the regiment and its staff, Lieut.-Col. J. W. Little, honorary colonel of the Seventh, paraded together with Lieut.-Col. A. H. Macdonell, D. S. O.; Lieut.-Col. C. W. Belton, P. A. M. C.; Major Gordon-Hall, C. S. O.; Major E. C. Dean, C. P. A.; and Major Wood Leonard, Sixth Field Battery.

Rev. Richard Whiting, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was the preacher of the occasion, and delivered an excellent discourse. His subject was taken from Ecclesiastes, I, 8: "To everything there is a season—a time for peace, and a time for war." There would be no gaining the statement that the militia belonged to the government of force, he said. The government must be maintained, by force, if necessary.

When War Shall Cease.
Men dream of the time when soldiers and war shall be no more, but that time has not yet come. Perhaps no persons would be better pleased if that were the case, than the soldiers themselves. The militia formed international police, to preserve order among the nations of the earth. Contingencies from without or within might send soldiers to war, and they must be ready at all times to go to battle. They were unnecessary, as were police, to a large number of people, but there were others for whom police and soldiers were both needed.

"My own personal opinion, and I try to be an optimist, is that we are a long way from the era of universal peace," said Mr. Whiting. "What is the church doing to bring about universal peace? Religion, philosophic and dogmatic, is not doing much. Religion, spiritual, is doing a great deal. The spirit of religion is the spirit of love and righteousness and truth and justice, and of a sound mind. The polemics of the church have always made fighting glorious. You are not a circumstance to the fighting of sects among themselves. In the recent war in the United States the church did not dominate war, but war dominated it. As a result, all the churches were split, and the Methodist Church has a Methodist Church South, and Methodist Church North. The Presbyterians and the Episcopalians are the same way. The church did not stop, but aided the war. The spirit of the church will yet prevent it."

Rev. Mr. Whiting referred to the Brock centenary. One hundred years ago, Gen. Brock, aided by a few English, some native-born Canadians, and some Indians, drove back the enemy. Canada was a very tiny factor in the world's history at that time. By the immigration of freshets, Canada was gaining sons from all the world. She was becoming rich, richer than any country in the world in an equal length of time, and was becoming envied of the nations of the world. There was a danger in that. Some time Canada may have to say to some nation, "Thus far shalt thou go and no farther." The soldiers may be called upon to defend the country. He hoped and

expected that each would be filled with love of country and principle. Mr. Whiting made a strong plea for peace at home. Canada was very cosmopolitan, and there was a danger here.

"If there is anything that has given me concern in my thoughts about Canada it is the disaffection of French and English in Quebec and Ontario," he stated. "Their ideals are different—one is Anglo-Saxon, the other Norman. The assimilation that has gone on during the past 100 years has been wonderful, which shows the overpowering love of God. It takes more than a few hundred years to change national characteristics. There is a difference. I am thinking now of the temperance cause, all the rest of it. But I think you will agree with me when I say that any person who says or does anything to accentuate these differences is a criminal enemy of the Dominion."

The choir, under the direction of Choirmaster A. D. Jordan, rendered special music. The band also played during the offertory.

CHELSEA GREEN IS

READY TO COME IN

Twenty-Five Ratepayers Signed Saturday Evening at Meeting Called for That Purpose.

A VERY LIVELY TIME

Some Ratepayers Are Not Convinced That the Suburb Is Getting the Best of the Deal.

Twenty-five ratepayers of the village of Chelsea Green have already signed their willingness to transfer their municipal allegiance from the Township of Westminster to the city of London, by signing the annexation petitions. These were presented for signatures for the first time Saturday night, at the meeting called at the instigation of the committee, which had been previously appointed to interview the city council and arrange terms for the coming union. The report prepared by the committee was entirely satisfactory to the majority of the ratepayers present, and they signed the papers accordingly, but a few assented themselves and agreed to "think the matter over" before finally committing themselves. The majority of the ratepayers secured the majority of the ratepayers will have signed.

Mr. Percy St. Clair Aldrich, the chairman of the committee, spoke at some length, explaining the terms stated in the agreement. The majority of the terms were very satisfactory, but at times some knotty clause would arise and disturb the peace of the meeting. Then the ripping of speech would be turned into turbulent waves, and after the chairman's table had received the command for "Order!" several times soothing oil would be poured on the troubled waters by Lieut.-Col. Gairthorne or by Mr. Aldrich himself.

Mr. Aldrich began his speech by strenuously denying the rumors which he heard had been circulated to the effect that the council of 1913 could quash the terms of the agreement if they so desired, and place the assessment and tax rate of property belonging to ratepayers in "The Green" at the city levels. This agreement was made out with the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, and the talk of changing the terms in the agreement was folly and foolishness.

Later in the evening, for the benefit of the late-comers, he again laid considerable emphasis on this point. Mr. Harry Clarke, one of the ratepayers, who had previously taken considerable interest in the matter, made a reference, thought the chairman was stressing this particular part too much, and took occasion to say so.

The chairman is laying too much importance on the fact that Mr. Clarke, ready for an argument, "But I know when South London was annexed the assessment of that district varied annually, and why won't the same thing happen to Chelsea Green?" "In reply to Brother Clarke, I might say that the assessment of South London was not fixed," said Mr. John Cummings. Mr. Clarke strenuously denied the brotherhood relation was made out with the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, and the talk of changing the terms in the agreement was folly and foolishness.

After peace was restored the chairman then explained the bridge problem. If the bridge of the present bridge is destroyed within fifteen years, requiring the building of a new structure, an additional half-mile will be added on to the fixed rate, making the new rate of Chelsea Green. The report testified that a new bridge would cost \$30,000, but that at the present time he could see no cause for alarm with the present one. If the new bridge was necessary the additional expense would only be 50 cents for every \$1,000 of assessment. Chelsea Green's share would then amount to \$48.66. The city would bear the rest of the expense.

The agreement also stated that the city promised to erect water mains and sufficient street lights to meet the requirements of the district.

The present proposed school would have to be enlarged and graded to city qualifications. Two new rooms would be necessary, but the city would meet this expense.

After explaining minor portions of the agreement Chairman Aldrich laid the petitions on the table ready for signatures. About 25 signed, including several of those who at first were the most outspoken against the circulating the petitions among the ratepayers who were not present.
