FERRY RATES WILL
NOT BE INCREASED

Rumor Caused Consternation
Among Merchants on Both
Sides of the River.

Sarnia, Dec. 17.—A rumor to the effect that the Port Huron and Sarnia Ferry Company intends to charge a ten-cent fare has caused considerable consternation both in Sarnia and Port Huron.

The American merchants especially were quite excited about it, and several of them hastened to the offices of the company and wanted to know whether there was any truth in it. One man in particular anxiously inquired whether the ferry company intended to ruin his Christmas trade. There is, however, according to the manager of the line, no truth in the rumor at all.

Where it started is not known, but over a month ago a report was circulated that the line would charge a ten-cent fare after the first of the month, and only operate one boat. It is safe to say, though, that the ferries will continue to run as they have been doing and that no increase in the fare will be made.

MAY REVISE ACT

Ferry Fight at Border is Not Yet
Ended.

Sarnia, Dec. 17.—The ferry fight between the town and the Port Huron and Sarnia Ferry Company is not yet ended. Mayor McGibbon states that the situation here has been brought to the attention of the League of Canadian Municipalities and that the matter will be taken up by them in its municipal bearing.

It is intimated that the league will take steps to have the Dominion ferry act revised or changed as is necessary. If this be the case, interesting times

can be expected in the future, and the stand to be taken by the ferry company is a matter for conjecture.

WAS USED CRUELY

Turned Out in Cold Without Money
or Proper Clothes.

According to the boy, he was turned adrift without money, or even an overcoat, and clothed only in a light summer suit. The lad was handed over to the Children's Aid Society, who will investigate the case.

STOLEN TURKEY COST
INGERSOLL MAN \$10

Told Conflicting Stories of How
He Got the Bird From
Farmer.

Ingersoll, Dec. 17.—Magistrate Paterson yesterday afternoon found Chas. Cannon, a local young man, guilty of the theft of a turkey belonging to Mr. Frank McMulken. After all the evidence for the prosecution had been adduced, Cannon went into the box on his own behalf.

Chief Fish stated that Cannon when arrested told him he got the turkey from a farmer. In view of the contradictory stories told by Cannon, and he having admitted that his first statement was incorrect, the magistrate found him guilty. He imposed a fine of \$10, \$3.50 of which is to go to Mr. McMulken, and in default of payment, one month in jail.
