

BISON BACKSTOP WANTS TRIAL WITH LONDON CLUB

Catcher Named Archibald With Buffalo International League Team May Be Signed Up by Manager Deneau—London Club Writes to the Holdouts.

[BY JINX.] R. St. Archibald is the somewhat classical name borne by a catcher who wrote to the London Club asking for a try-out this morning. Archibald is at present with the Buffalo International League team. He has been with the Buffalo Club all spring, and now, realizing that he will likely be farmed out to some minor league club, he wants to come to London.

Rube Will Write Him. President Stevely turned Archibald's application over to Manager Deneau, and the latter will write him with a view to bringing him here. Any catcher who has remained with the Buffalo Club this far into the season must have shown something, and if the London Club can get him here, he is liable to prove a valuable player, and one whom the club will probably get a price for next season.

Holdouts Expected In. Manager Deneau has also written to the holdouts, and it is likely that terms will be arranged and Linneborn, Bierbauer and company brought into the fold. He is confident of getting both Linneborn and Bierbauer here next week. Whether Powell will come or not is a question. It is not improbable that Powell will be traded. Jo-Jo Keenan is anxious to land the big fellow, and Manager Deneau is perfectly willing to make a trade, provided something worth while is offered in return.

Dug-Outs To Be Enlarged. The fans will see many changes at Tecumseh Park this season. Manager Deneau has ordered the players' dug-outs enlarged. The dug-outs have been two small since they were first made. Last year the players had a bench alongside them, which would hold more players than the dug-outs themselves. Rube does not like the idea of the players sitting out in full view of the grandstand, and he blames this for much of the trouble between the fans and the players last season. This year the players will have to sit in the dug-outs, which will be enlarged twice the size they are at present.

President Stevely completed the arrangements for transporting the London players to this city, and the first batch will likely be in Sunday evening. "Frenchy" Chaput, one of the pitchers Manager Deneau will depend upon this season, is in great shape. He has been playing hockey all winter, and has taken on about nine pounds. Chaput had a lot of hard luck here at the end of last season, but he believes he can deliver the goods. He certainly pitched nice ball for Berlin two years ago.
