NEW ART BUILDING
WILL COST \$3,500

Contract Let for Structure by Western Fair Board.

Contracts were yesterday afternoon awarded by the building committee of the Western Fair Association for the construction of a new art building at Queen's Park, to be erected between the Crystal Palace and the Horticultural Hall, and facing Dundas street, at a cost of \$3,500.

Work was commenced this morning by the successful tenderer, Mr. Harry Hayman, and will be completed as soon as possible. Parks Commissioner Hamilton and Superintendent Dilger were also present at the meeting, with President W. J. Reid, Ald. Johnson, W. M. Spencer, of the grounds and buildings committee, and Secretary A. M. Hunt.

The building was located in accordance with the ideas of Mr. Dilger, who has a scheme for the further improvement of the appearance of the grounds by a series of terraces.

WEST LONDONERS ARE IRRITATED BY DELAY

Want to Know Why Bridge Is Not Built and Breakwater Repaired.

A special meeting of the West London Progressive Association was held last evening in Collins' Hall, and the fraction of the city council in connection with the repairs to the West London breakwater, and the erection of the Wharfedale road bridge, was severely censured.

While no definite action was taken in regard to either of these matters the meeting decided that it would be very unwise to allow interest in these much-needed improvements to die, and it is altogether likely that the regular meetings will be resumed in the near future. The meeting last night was one of the largest and most enthusiastic in the history of the organization, and the officers are greatly pleased at the interest shown in the work of the association, which at one time looked as if it would have to be dissolved.

BERLIN REUNION

Hallman Family Gathered From All Parts of the Country.

Berlin, June 26. — The second reunion of the descendants of Anthony and Benjamin Hallman, of Waterloo County, gathered here today from all parts of the United States and Canada and picked at Victoria Park. More than one thousand people attended the reunion. The Hallmans are the most widely known people of the county, many of them comprising its first settlers, and their history goes back to 1714, when Anthony Hallman left his home in Germany and settled on a farm in Pennsylvania.

Benjamin Hallman, whose ancestry is traced to Anthony, was born in the thirties. His eldest son, Jacob, at 19 years of age, alive to the opportunity that presented itself in the almost unknown regions bordering the Great Lakes, set out on foot. Reaching the vicinity where Hespeler now is, he engaged in farming, an occupation extensively carried on by his descendants in this county. Later his family settled in the old Eby homestead near Waterloo. Each member of the family today

ROBT. MCINTYRE GOES INTO SADDLER HOUSE

Paid \$7,000 For Hotel in King Street—A Deal That Didn't Go Through.

The board of license commissioners of London will consider an application for the transfer of the license of the Saddle House, to Robert McIntyre, the well-known Strathroy hotelkeeper, at a meeting in Inspector A. R. Galpin's office on Saturday, July 6.

Mr. McIntyre, who conducted a hotel in Strathroy before local option was carried in that town, is understood to have paid \$7,000 for the Saddle House license.

Some months ago Mr. A. Montiech, of Tecumseh avenue, purchased the Saddle House business, the same figure being agreed upon by Mr. Montiech deposited \$1,000 in good faith, but it is said, then found that his family would not go into the hotel. As a result the deal was called off, and Mr. Montiech came to an arrangement with Mr. Saddle whereby he received a portion of his money back.

TURNOVER WAS \$500,000 IN THE MARKET HOUSE

Ald. Wright Cannot See Why the Butchers Object To Rental Increase.

No. 3 committee of the city council wrestled with market house rents for a time yesterday afternoon, and finally decided to allow the matter to remain over until it is learned how much money it will take to put the house in the condition demanded by the board of health. Better sewerage connection is absolutely necessary, while a ventilation system for the basement is required. The building must also be painted.

Ald. Murphy declared it would eat up between three and four thousand dollars to do the work. Engineer Wright figured the cost at about \$1,500. The only tender for painting was for \$550.

It had been proposed to charge the butchers \$16 a month for upstairs stalls, and \$8 for those in the basement. Ald. Ashplant moved that the scale be \$12.50 and \$6.50 respectively. Chairman Wright declared that the butchers have no cause to complain of high rents. Last year they did business which totalled over \$500,000. When the discussion it was brought out that though Engineer Wright has advertised for six weeks for tenders for the plumbing necessary at the market house, not a bid has been received. (When the engineer reports on the cost of the improvements, the rentals will be again considered.)

Smallman and Ingram complained that the market at the rear of the big departmental store is insanitary, and asked that it be paved. The company is willing to pay its share of the improvement, and Engineer Wright was ordered to report on the cost of the work. It is altogether likely that the request of the firm will be granted.

The city engineer reported on the smoking nuisance, and a copy of the document will be furnished each alderman before any action is taken.
