Strikers Fought To Stop Men Working

Twenty Went Back After Having Been Out Two Months.

[Canadian Press.] Paterson, N. J., May 19.—Through a line of police two blocks long, twenty hands formerly employed by the silk mill of the American Price Company, went back to work today after a strike of more than two months. Hundreds of pickets of the Industrial Workers of the World sought to prevent their return, but the police guard was too effective. There was a lively scrimmage for a time, and six pickets were arrested.

The I.W.O. mill is a comparatively small one, employing normally thirty hands. The return of its strikers with demands unsatisfied is heralded by the manufacturers as meaning the near end of the strike. Leaders of the Industrial Workers of the World, on the other hand, maintain that the fight will go on unabated, and that few others will yield.

ANARCHY PREVAILS

Refugees From Mexico Tell of Terrible Conditions in the South.

[Canadian Press.] Galveston, Texas, May 19.—Nearly two score refugees from Mexico, who have just arrived aboard the steamer Noruega, report conditions in the southern republic acute, in some instances bordering on a state of anarchy. They boarded the steamer at Vera Cruz and Tampico.

The refugees included businessmen and their families, employees of foreign concerns operating in the larger cities, a Methodist missionary and three men who are said to have been officers in the federal army during the regime of the late President Madero.

The Noruega had the largest passenger list of any steamer arriving at this port this season.

H. G. BURT DEAD

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, May 19.—Horace Greeley Burt, former president of the Union Pacific Railroad system, and later chief engineer for the Chicago Association of Commerce, died here today. He was 84 years old. Three weeks ago he was operated upon for a malignant growth, and complications which followed caused his death.

DIED IN BOSANQUET

Mrs. William Addison Had Been Ill For Some Time.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Forest, May 19.—The death occurred at her home in Bosanquet on Sunday, after a long illness, of Mrs. William Addison, aged 65. Besides her husband, she is survived by seven children, Peter and William in New Ontario, Herbert in British Columbia, John and Roy at home, Peter Campbell of Canada, and Mrs. Peter Caley, of St. Marys. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence, and will be conducted by Father Labelle, of London.

Trying To Settle Street Car Strike

Representatives of Both Sides in Conference at Cincinnati.

[Canadian Press.] Cincinnati, Ohio, May 19.—Announcement of the settlement of the street car strike was expected today as a result of conferences between officials of the Cincinnati Traction Company and representatives of the union organization. The representatives of the company and the strikers discussed a basis of settlement all day yesterday and adjourned the matter today. Just what was accomplished at the first meeting could not be ascertained except that progress had been made, and that the prospect of the strike being called off had brightened.

Pending the result of the conference, no action was expected to be taken by Judge Geoghegan on the application of Mayor Hunt for a receiver for the traction company. Arguments on the application were scheduled to be resumed in the common pleas court, but it was expected that Mayor Hunt would ask that action be deferred for twenty-four hours. No attempt was made by the traction company to operate cars.

EXPRESS REDUCTION IN EFFECT JUNE 10

Arrangements Completed For New Schedule Going Into Effect Shortly.

[Canadian Press.] Vancouver, B. C., May 19.—It is announced that W. S. Stout, of the Dominion Express Company, has made arrangements, so that the proposed date of the inauguration of the express rate reduction will not have to be brought to the attention of the railway commissioners. Under the new arrangement, it is understood the new rates will come into effect June 10 instead of July 5 as at first proposed.

WAS DESPONDENT

Charles Keidel Committed Suicide in a Beach Front Hotel.

[Canadian Press.] Atlantic City, N. J., May 19.—Charles Keidel, 45 years, an official of the Knabe Piano Company, and said to be a member of a well-known Baltimore family, committed suicide, the police say, by shooting himself through the heart, in a prominent beach front hotel last Friday. The authorities declare they were not notified of the tragedy, news of which did not become known until today, after the body had been shipped to Baltimore. It is believed that despondency caused by illness was responsible for Keidel's alleged act.

FAVOR CELEBRATION

British Columbia' Methodists Send Resolution Regarding Peace Centenary.

[Canadian Press.] Vancouver, B. C., May 19.—At the final session of the Methodist conference Saturday a resolution commending the proper celebration of one hundred years of peace between Canada and the United States was passed. Dr. Chown, general superintendent, proposed that history text books in Canada and the United States should be revised, so that the rising generation might be brought up on facts instead of fiction.

FORCED INTO PORT

Canadian Auxiliary Steamer, Was Driven Into Charleston Harbor.

New York, May 19.—The Canadian auxiliary steamer yacht Veremere arrived today from Charleston, S. C., with her owner, W. G. Prethorne, of Toronto, on board. The Veremere left New York five months ago, and cruised in the West Indies. Off Charleston, a two-days gale drove them into port, where all the guests were landed. Bullets fired by three strangers who entered a Brooklyn dance hall, where Defino was sitting at a table, chatting with friends, killed him instantly. In the turmoil following the shooting the murderers escaped.

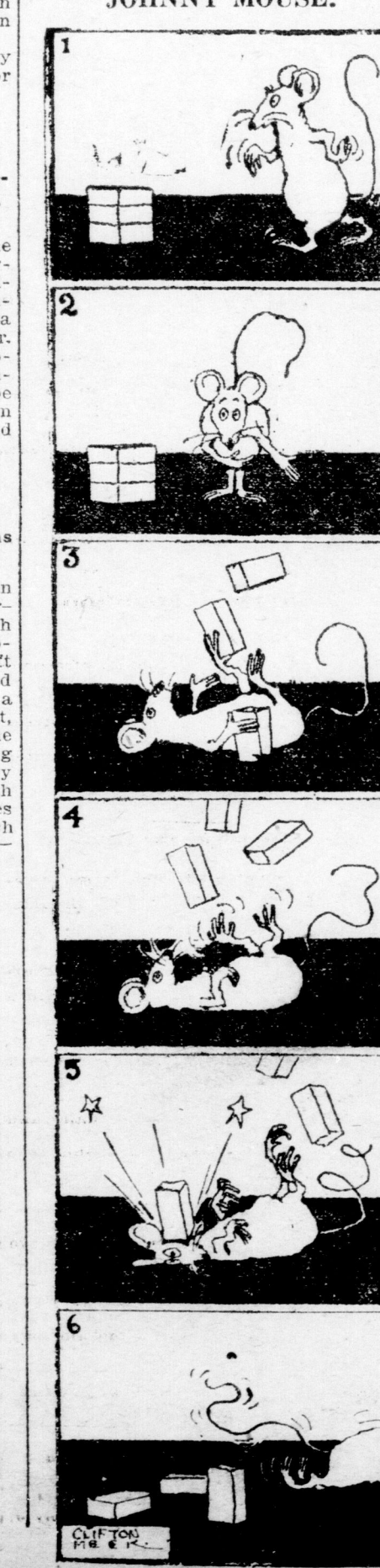

Floating Drydocks A White Elephant

Boats Will Not Go In For Repairs at Montreal Owing to Cost.

Montreal, May 19.—That the \$2,000,000 floating drydock placed here last fall is likely to become a white elephant is confessed by shipping authorities. It was thought that shipowners would use the dock for all repairs needed by vessels, but it has been found that no company will put a ship in the dock while there is the slightest chance of sending it to British ports for repairs. A case in point is that of the Elder-Dempster steamship Benquo, which will get a much-required scraping when she gets to South Africa where the work can be done by cheap black labor. As the shipping companies are getting cheaper insurance by reason of the dock being here, it is suggested that, while they will not use it, they are not entitled to the advantage, and that it should be taken to Quebec.

WINGHAM FIREMEN INSURED BY COUNCIL

Town Will Carry \$1,000 on Each Member of the Department.
