THRILLING STORY TOLD BY CASTAWAYS

Wrecked On An Island in the
Southern Pacific.

MAROONED TWENTY DAYS

Lived for Seventeen Days on Raw
Oysters and Clams—Aided by
Malay Woodcutters.

London, Feb. 26.—An exciting story of the sea is told in the Pioneer Mail by Mr. P. Collins of Chicago, and A. J. Dann, of Buffalo, the survivors of the Glasgow schooner Marie Ellen, who reached Rangoon from Singapore. The schooner was wrecked in February last off the coast of Dutch Borneo, and the survivors, after spending twenty days on an island, they have been wandering about in search of work. They shipped on board the Marie Ellen at Manila on January 27, 1913, and after calling at various islands reached La He Duta, in British North Borneo, on February 2, leaving again early next morning.

"Late that afternoon," says Mr. Collins, "the wind began to freshen from the eastward, and we stood away on the port tack, intending to put about on the starboard tack at the end of the late dog watch."

"When two bells had gone in that watch order came to close reef the sails and heave to. This was done and the wind began to haul to the northeast. We drifted on to the southward until about four bells in the first watch, when the skipper decided to shake out the reef and run before the wind. About three bells in the middle watch the man of the look-out, Hans Wordman, sang out, 'Breakers ahead!' Those on the watch below rushed out on deck as the cry came from officers of 'All hands out on deck! Never mind your clothes!'

"When we got on deck we found the sails flapping, and before the schooner could get out she struck the reef. The reef with such force that she carried away her masts. The mainmast in falling smashed the port lifeboat. The schooner began to splinter, and the heavy sea began to smash the schooner up. An effort was made to launch the starboard lifeboat, but it was useless in face of the heavy sea. It soon became a case of every man for himself, and we watched our opportunity to drop over the side and swim for a small island we could see in the distance off the port quarter."

"By swimming diagonally across the sea we managed to reach shore in an exhausted condition and lay and rested. The land we had gained we afterwards learned was Pulau Bunio Island. At daybreak we looked for the ship, but all we could see was part of the stern still stuck fast on the reef. We began to look around for our shipmates, and searched the beach from abeam of the wreck to the southern end of the island without seeing anyone. As far as we knew we were marooned."

"A search was made for the inhabitants, and after going about four or five miles along the beach we came upon what appeared to be a timber chute. We climbed up this to see what was at the other end and discovered three trees that we had recently cut. In a few minutes some pieces of matting were found. The largest pieces we used for clothing, we having had nothing on but a shirt when the cry came to come on deck. The smaller pieces of matting we used as a cover for our heads."

"Search was then made for fresh water, and we were successful in discovering a spring. A hearty drink and bath soon put us in better spirits, and we began to look around for something to eat. We thought of fruit, but could find none, so we had to make do with what we found. Here some oysters were found, and digging in the sand with our hands, we found a plentiful supply of clams. Having no means of lighting a fire, we subsisted on raw oysters and clams."

"We made walks around the island by short stages, always keeping the sea on our right, so as to make sure we were not going over the same ground twice. We walked and walked until we had been right around the island, and then sat down to decide what was the best thing to be done. We came to the conclusion that we had better keep close to the timber chute in case any one came to cut timber."

"For seventeen days we lived on raw oysters and clams. On the morning of the eighteenth day we started on another tour of the island, and had covered about three-quarters of it when we saw smoke coming out of the bushes. At first we thought it was some one of the natives cooking, but on going closer found it was some Malay woodcutters cooking their evening meal. We had some trouble in getting the Malays to understand how we had come there, but after they had been shown the remains of the shipwrecked schooner, they understood and showed us with us. Haj Ali, who proved to be the chief of the party, treated us very well and he and his men showed us the way to the beach. Two days later we left the island, where we had spent twenty days, and were taken to Sandakan, where they were sent on to Singapore, their story having in the meanwhile been verified."

THEATRE 2,500 YEARS' OLD WILL BE IN USE AGAIN

Rome, Feb. 21.—The success of Greek tragedies given in the antiquarium-air theatre at Fiesole, near Florence, and their reputation at the stadium in Rome has led to the ambitious project of giving Greek Hellenic representations at the Greek theatre at Syracuse, more than 2,400 years old.

Professor Ettore Ramagnoli, who has passed his life in translating Greek tragedies into Italian, has been entrusted with the translation of "Agamemnon" and the staging of it for the occasion.

The costumes will be taken from the figures of Greek vases of the time, which actually represent the characters in the tragedy. As for the scenery, little will have to be done to produce complete illusion of the City of Mycenae.

The theatre of Syracuse was the largest, after those of Miletus and Megalopolis, known to the ancient Greeks and was erected in the fifth century B. C. It was hewn out of the solid rock and is in the shape of a semi-circle. Of the original tiers of seats forty-six are in existence.

Some of the tiers were divided into compartments, the Greek inscriptions showing the names of their owners being still legible; and as many of them were still legible, this is indirect evidence that at Syracuse the theatre was frequented by women, although that is denied by most historians.

Nature always has combined to render this theatre a thing of beauty. All about it are orange and lemon groves, with gold and yellow fruits; above is Mount Temetites, circled by the blue Ionian Sea, while to the south opens the Temple of Jove.

Amid such surroundings the lovers of Greek art and literature will welcome the return of Aeschylus to the city of his adoption next spring.

TRIP TO ANTARCTIC IN AID OF SCIENCE

Attempt to Determine Insularity
of Graham's Land.

AIRMAN WITH EXPEDITION

Will Help in Effort to Locate a Peninsula Which Causes Accumulation of Ice.

London, Feb. 26.—The organization of the British Antarctic expedition, 1914, is proceeding apace, and the leader, J. Foster Stacchouse, F.R.G.S., has made a number of appointments to his navigating and scientific staff.

Lieut. A. E. Harbord, R. N., who has been lent by the admiralty, will command the Discovery. Capt. Scott's old ship, which Mr. Stacchouse has acquired from the Hudson's Bay Company, Lieut. Harbord was an executive navigating officer on the Nimrod in the Shackleton expedition, 1907-09, and has since been employed in the hydrographic department of the admiralty.

Friends of Scott's Aid.
The first officer, who perished with Scott, Lieut. Richard H. Garstin, of the Royal Indian Marine, surveying lieutenant on the Northbrook, the navigating officer will be Lieut. R. Beatty, from the same service, a cousin of Rear Admiral David Beatty. These appointments are subject to the approval of the directors of the Royal Indian Marine.

Chief Petty Officer Tom Green, who sailed with Scott in the Discovery, and the Terra Nova, will probably be the boatswain.

Several members of the scientific staff have already been appointed. These include Lord Congleton, of the Grenadier Guards, who has done a great deal of military survey work and is a fully qualified surveyor.

Mr. Stacchouse in an interview said: "It must be distinctly understood that the expedition is making charts, surveying, explorations, and a solution of several important scientific problems is of great objects, and in this direction we hope to accomplish sufficient to have the name of the British Antarctic expedition, 1914, honorably remembered among the expeditions of the past. After sailing at the end of the month, the discovery will proceed to the east side of Grahamland."

Aviator Will Help.
"Here I propose to land a party of fifteen men about Dec. 20. Their great task will be to determine a doubt as to the insularity of Grahamland. The existing state of affairs behind Grahamland would explain the great accumulation of ice between that land and the Great Barrier. In this important work they will have the assistance of an airman, whose name I am not yet at liberty to disclose."

Returning after wintering in the ice, we shall pick up the last party about January, 1916, and then endeavor to make Charcot Land. Here we shall winter again, and in the following spring sail down the coast of King Edward VII. Land to McMurdo Sound, charting and sounding en route. We shall leave McMurdo Sound early in 1917 for New Zealand.

New Land for Britain.
"Apart from the scientific value of this work there are other excellent reasons why Britain should do it. The first is that King Edward VII. Land was discovered by Capt. Scott, and should be surveyed by his compatriots, and the second is that all the territories between meridians 20 degrees west and 30 degrees west were proclaimed dependencies of the Falkland Islands in 1908."

Was Leading Cartoonist.
