Winnipeg Loan Was Placed in London

Financial Authorities Advise Cities
Not To Make Too Great Demands.

London, July 22.—In view of the adverse criticism which recently has been levelled in England against Canadian municipal securities, the splendid reception given to the latest issue by Winnipeg, which was announced today to have been over-subscribed in advance, has produced the greatest satisfaction in Canadian financial circles here.

The comparatively low price at which the loan was floated is unquestionably due, it is said, to the recent uncalculated attacks on civic borrowers by Horne Payne, fiscal agent in England for the Canadian Northern Railway, which it is now apparent the city has not taken too seriously.

Canadian financial authorities on this side are confident that the flotilla will prove an advantage to the Canadian situation generally, but in their opinion it would be better for other cities, especially those of lower rank, not to attach too much importance to Winnipeg's success.

The whole situation bristles with difficulties, and civic authorities will be well advised to confine their financial commitments for the present to essentials.

Fell Forty Feet May Not Recover

Thorndale, July 22.—Wellington Weston, aged 23 years, was terribly hurt at his farm near Kintore, yesterday, when, as he was repairing a silo, he slipped and fell forty feet on to the cement floor of the structure. When picked up it was found that he had fractured his hip and ankle, and had sustained a terrible shaking. It is feared that he has internal hurts. He has been unconscious ever since the accident and his condition is regarded as critical.

Young Inventor Buried at Aylmer

Aylmer, July 22.—The death occurred in Detroit on Monday afternoon after an illness of two years of Springs McDonald, a formerly highly esteemed Aylmer young man.

Deceased, who was in his 34th year, is survived by his mother. He left Aylmer some 20 years ago and entered the Central Savings Bank in Detroit. Later he patented a trolley, which he afterwards manufactured, together with automobile parts. For the last few years he had been representing a large automobile concern, travelling throughout the States.

The remains were brought to Aylmer on Wednesday and the funeral took place from the G. T. R. depot, arrival of the 1:15 Wabash eastbound train.

FIRE AT INGERSOLL

Spark From Train Started Blaze in the
Roof of Warehouse.

Ingersoll, July 22.—What for a time was feared would prove a serious fire broke out yesterday afternoon shortly after 2 o'clock in the roof of a storehouse on the property of Nagle & Mills at the rear of their planing mill. The origin of the fire is believed to have been a spark from a C. P. R. locomotive. Although the flames had made much progress before the firemen arrived, they rendered effective service. The flames were confined to the roof, but water and smoke caused considerable damage to the contents of the building, principally doors and hardwood flooring. The loss is covered by insurance.

GORED BY BULL

Harrison, July 22.—David McEachern, of Cotswold, had several injuries broken today and was badly shaken up when he was attacked by a bull. The animal knocked him down and commenced goring him, but he had the presence of mind to grab the bull by the ring in his nose and in this manner regained his feet, and being a powerful man, he gradually kept backing the enraged animal up until he came to a fence, over which he jumped and escaped further injuries. The bull at this stage apparently lost his nerve, and returned to the pasture.

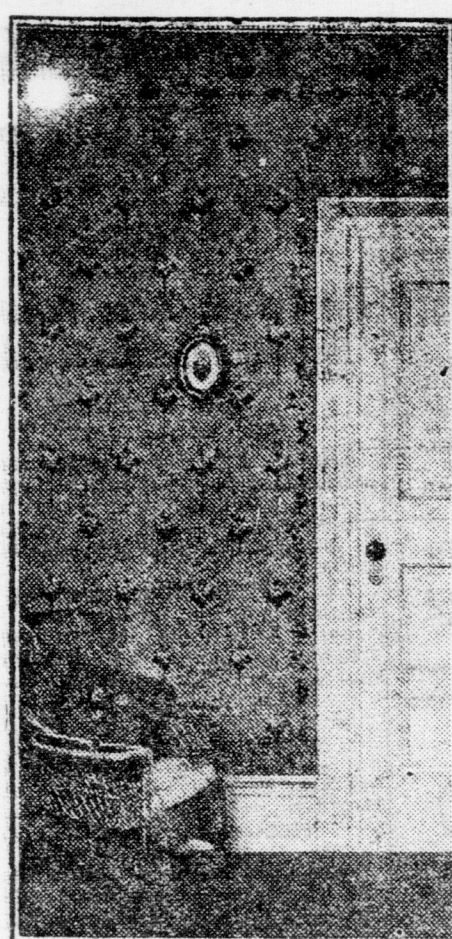
