

FAMOUS COLLECTOR LAID TO REST TODAY

John Sonley Had Great Group
of Valuable Indian
Relics.

The funeral of John Sonley who passed away in Victoria Hospital on Sunday, was held from his residence 208 Wharfedale road, this afternoon at 2:30.

Mr. Sonley was private secretary to the late Mr. Shaw-Wood and it was through this position he became the owner of one of the finest collection of Indian relics in the Dominion.

While employed by Mr. Shaw-Wood he lived at the Shaw-Wood residence on the Hyde Park road most of the time. As the site of the dwelling is an old Indian village he was able to obtain many additions to his then large collection. He collected many of the old Indian weapons and ornaments that had been left by the neutral tribes that lived there for 300 years.

The collection is now at his home in London West and many of the prominent scientists of the Dominion have come to see it. The most valuable article in the collection is an old tobacco pipe.

There is a lizard carved by a master hand on the top and on the front of the bowl there is a human face done in masterly fashion. This is considered one of the most valuable artifacts ever found in Canada.

Mr. Sonley was constable for London West for a number of years. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World.

The pallbearers for the funeral were: A. Wilson, J. McNamara, B. Cunningham, C. Jarvis, P. C. Hooper and J. H. Coulter.

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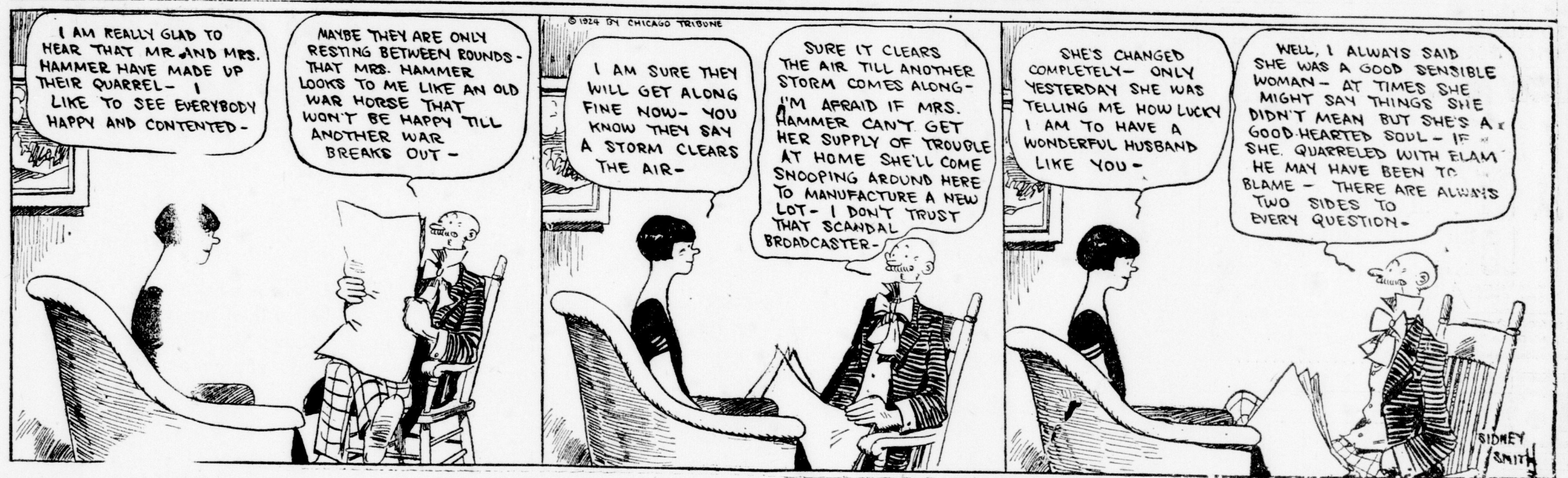

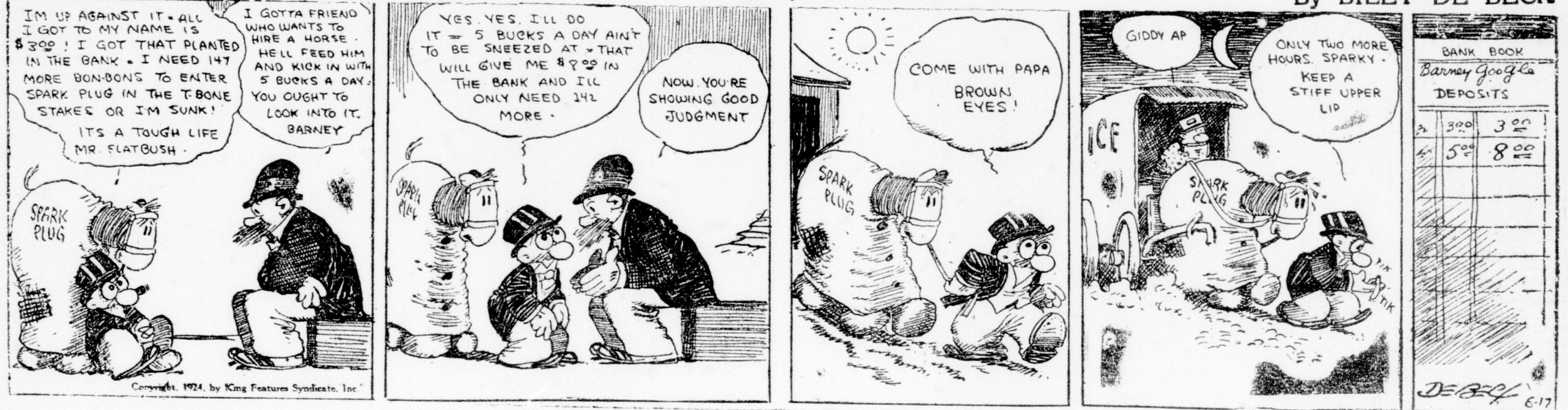
