

DOROTHY ELLINGSON IS SANE; WILL BE TRIED FOR MURDER



Self-Confessed Slayer of
Mother Has Been Exam-
ined For Six Weeks.

MAY GET LONG TERM

Young Girl To Be Returned
To San Francisco For
Trial.

San Francisco, May 21.—Dorothy Ellingson, who confessed that in a violent rage she shot and killed her own mother when that mother tried to lay a restraining hand on her waywardness, has been found sane by the experts at the Napa state insane asylum. As a result, she will be returned to San Francisco to be tried for murder.

After close observation and examination for six weeks, the Napa specialists unqualifiedly pronounce the emotionless girl sane. Six weeks ago a jury of her peers declared her insane. Some days before that a specialist for the state told the court she was sane. Against this another specialist retained by the defense told the same court she was insane.

The girl fought bitterly against the jury's insanity finding before she was sent to Napa, declaring she was as sane as anyone in the court and that she wished to take the punishment for her self-confessed crime. The insanity finding was a victory for her attorneys, but a defeat for the defendant, who displayed the same rage against the lawyers retained by her father for her defence that must have flared up when she shot her mother. Now the findings of the specialists at Napa is a counter-victory for Dorothy, though it may be the means of securing for her a long term in prison.

brilliance of 5 o'clock in the afternoon on a clear May day.

The N-24 and N-25 pulled themselves up from the ice with a load of well over 6,000 pounds each, probably a world's record for an aeroplane. An examination of the tracks left by the planes on the snow showed each ran about a mile across the ice. During the first quarter of the way the planes broke through the ice sheet to the depth of ten inches.

As they gained momentum they taxied more lightly. The entire get-away was carried off without a hitch. To onlookers, however, the suspense was so acute that the cheers that went up as the planes took the air was almost hysterical. During the first hour after the departure most of us expected the planes to return. When they did not we knew that the long-planned dash for the top of the world was a reality.

Plant Norwegian Flag.
A duruluminum flagstaff for planting at the pole is being carried on the N-25, also a Norwegian flag, made by the wives of the two pilots. Any data such as the time of arrival at the pole will be written on a slip of paper inclosed in a thermos bottle and left there.

The intention of the party is to remain about six hours at the pole to enable them to make through the observations. If they are flying according to schedule the planes are now following a line twelve degrees east of Greenwich. They will pass over a wide swath of hitherto unexplored territory a couple of hundred miles in length.

It is here that Amundsen and Ellsworth are hopeful of finding some land.

It is now in the center of one of the finest farming districts of the county.

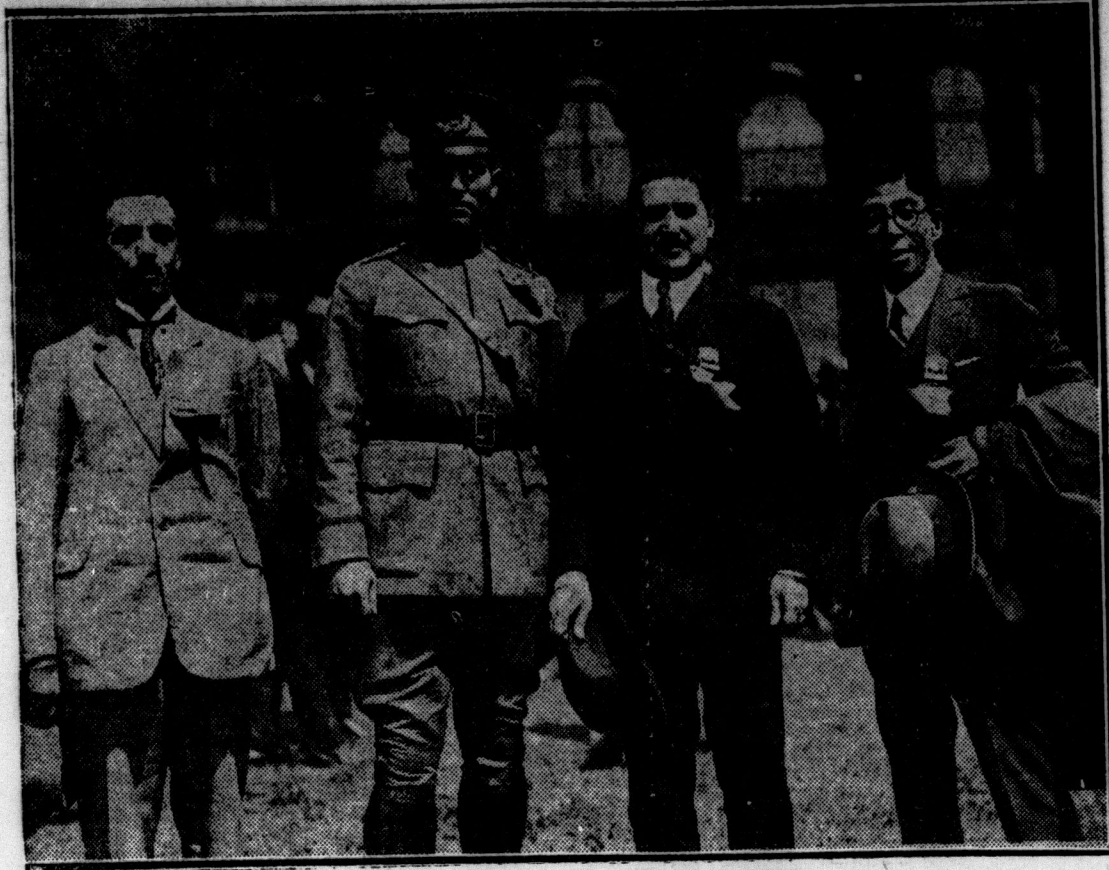

WILL ACT TONIGHT ON HOUSING AGENT

Appointment of Salesman Being
Pushed By Mayor—Board's
Power Questioned.

London's new building inspector and the matter of a salesman to sell London's municipal houses, will provide subjects for discussion by the housing commission tonight. The mayor has been the chief factor in urging the appointment of a salesman for the commission, on the ground that by this means the housing commission can recoup all its losses in the past. He also favors an immediate appointment, because real estate will sell easier now than later in the year. In this he has the backing of many aldermen.

Whether the housing commission has the power to appoint a salesman where money is to be spent the housing commission must go to the city council. On the other hand the new man is to be held on a commission basis, not a salary. The city solicitor is considering the powers of the commission at the present time.

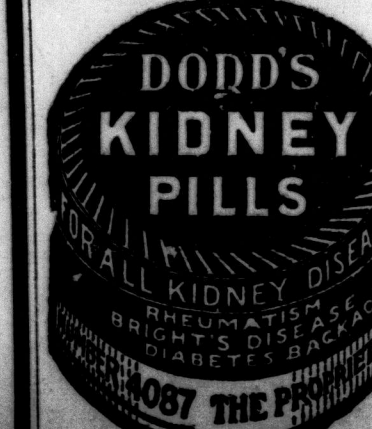
An excellent program included vocal numbers by Miss Agnes Foster and piano numbers by Miss Isaac.

Two knights of the road, Edward Delaney and Patrick Gleeson, bowed low before the throne of County Magistrate Hawshaw this morning and when the audience was over they paid \$7 each into the county coffers.

The two knights were arrested in the witching hour of midnight by High Constable Wharton shortly after they had kindled a roaring fire in the C. P. R. station at Crumlin.

Both prisoners, hale and hearty despite their advanced years, took the affair as a joke until the magistrate without blinking an eyelid stated that a fine of \$25 and costs each would be about the proper penalty. Delaney, the owner of \$150, missed several heart beats and his voice shook as he informed the court that he was 67 years of age and needed all his money.

"We were only there half an hour," explained Delaney. "We intended staying all night, though," put in his friend Patrick. Proud of Religion.

"My information is that men have been sleeping there every night for a week," said the high constable. "Not us," chorused the prisoners. F. H. COLES TAKEN BY SUDDEN DEATH

Prominent London Man Succumbs—Was Well-Known
in Athletic Circles.

Fred H. Coles died suddenly last night at his home, 474 Colborne street. He had been in failing health for some time, but death was not expected.

The late Mr. Coles was born in London 50 years ago, and his entire life has been spent here. For some years he has conducted a business as public accountant, with offices in the Imperial Bank building. He was very widely and favorably known. He was a communicant of St. Peter's cathedral and an active member of the Knights of Columbus.

In his younger days Mr. Coles was keenly interested in sport and in military affairs. Baseball was of particular interest to him, and he was recognized as a player of ability. He had an important part in building the baseball history of the city in the 90's, when London was recognized as always a strong competitor in every game. In later years he was a close follower and an enthusiastic supporter of amateur baseball.

In military life he was connected with what was known as the Seventh Fusiliers, which organization preceded the present First London Regiment.

Survivors are the widow, five daughters and four sons, five sisters, Mrs. Anderson of Chicago, Mrs. Bliss and Mrs. Hesbitt of Detroit, Mrs. Charles Wilson and Miss Ada Coles of London, and two brothers, Frank of Montreal and Col. W. G. of London.

Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Race Brawl Is Circus Sequel

Pine Bluff, Ark., May 22.—Ladd, a farming community twelve miles south of here, was the scene late last night of a threatened race riot, but quick action by officials prevented bloodshed.

EARL OF YPRES DIES AT LONDON, ENG., HOME

Luck, under whom French had served in India, where he performed brilliantly in bringing cavalry commands up to a high point of efficiency. Sir George had not forgotten that before and brought Colonel French out of retirement to write the new cavalry book. The result was characterized as "a masterpiece of lucid explanation and terse precision."

Then the question arose as to who was to carry out the alterations called for in the book. Some answered "the one who suggested them." French was made assistant adjutant-general of cavalry and proceeded to the attention of the entire British army. In these, through extraordinarily daring operations, he completely won his opponent, a general using methods which had been regarded as efficient and necessary until French's genius made them antiquated. French became a major-general the next year.

The Boer war was to French only another opportunity to show the ability of which the British military authorities had shelved seven years before. He was given the chief cavalry command and in numerous operations he proved himself both a great strategist and a superior tactician. He was mentioned in many despatches and went back to England at the close of the war to be knighted and given the command of all the troops at Aldershot with the rank of lieutenant-general.

Made Inspector-General.
In 1907, French was appointed inspector-general of the forces and five years later he was made chief of the imperial general staff. He was made a field marshal in 1913, and as such went to France at the beginning of the World War as commander-in-chief of the expeditionary forces. Here again he displayed his extraordinary ability as a military leader. He was in a way responsible for the change in the British cabinet, resulting in the creation of the ministry of munitions, at the head of which former Premier Lloyd George succeeded in awakening the munitions manufacturers to the necessity of rallying to the aid of the soldiers in the field.

In the early engagements in France, French's army was outnumbered by the enemy and short of high explosives to halt the German advance. To the latter was attributed the necessity for the strategic retreat from Mons, in which he handled the sorely tried British army with a foreigner's tact. Later, with 1,000,000 men under his command he scored his great victory at Ypres.

Retired as Lord Lieutenant.
Upon retirement as lord lieutenant of Ireland, French was created an earl by King George. His new honor was not gazetted for nearly a year afterward, when it was officially announced that he had elected to be known as the Earl of Ypres, after the place of his great victory in the war. Some surprise was occasioned by his title selection, it being quite unusual to take the name of a foreign place. A title, only a few of such examples appearing in the British records.

The Earl of Ypres, John Denton Pinkstone French, was the son of a captain of the Royal navy and was born Sept. 28, 1838, at Ripple, Kent. He joined H.M.S. Britannia in 1856, and was a naval cadet and midshipman four years. He entered the army in 1874.

JOHN WEST, AGED 80, IS FOUND DEAD IN BED

Former Well-Known London
Township Farmer Had
Lived Here 18 Years.

John West, for the past 18 years a resident of London, and formerly a well-known farmer of London township, was found dead in his bed at his home, 11 St. Andrew's street, early this morning. He had been in ill-health for some time.

Mr. West was born in London township 89 years ago. He retired from farming in 1917 and came to live in London. He was a prominent member of the Empress avenue Methodist church.

Surviving are his wife, Annie; three sons, Chester and Ralph of London township, and Jack of this city, and two daughters, Miss Mildred and Miss Mabel, both of London. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon from Mr. West's late home. Services are to be conducted by Rev. J. Dewey of Grace Methodist church. Interment to be made at Mount Pleasant cemetery.
