

wounds are serious, although not ne-cessarily dangerous. One of the balls en-tered the left side of his neok and was taken out on the right side. This ball passed through the base of the skull. The other ball entered the right side of the neck, near the base of the skull, took a down-ward course and lodged under the left shoulder blade. Both these balls have been extracted. He also received two knife wounds, one in the left side of the stomach and another in the left hip. The wounds in the neck are the most serious, but I do not think any of them will prove fatal." The cochess of Mr. Fricke during and subse-quent to the attack upon him was almost incredible. Mr. Leishman, vice-Chairman of the Carnegie company, was the first to rush into the affice when the shots were fired. The crazy Russian turned a revolver upon him, whereupon Mr. Fricke, though blood was flowing from his wounds, arose, knocked the Russian's arm up, and seizing him, forced him to thefloor. It was then the fellow inflicted the knife wounds. Burkman then freed himself and made his rush for the elevator. Mr. Frick maintained his self-possession while the surgeons operated upon him, and refneed to be nu under the infli-
