As soon as business picked up, Mr. Montgomery thought the condition of the market here would be excellent. He thought it was a mistake, however, to admit dressed lumber free, as this would result in the removal of the mills at Ogdensburg, Owego and Burlington to Canada in due time.

The Barley Duties.

Trade in Live Stock Will Increase.

The changes in the stock schedule are calculated to increase the volume of handlings at Buffalo. In the fall heavy entries are made here for sheep from Canada. Under the McKinley bill the duty was \$1.50 per head for sheep and 75 cents a head for lambs. The new tariff makes it 20 per cent. ad valorem on all stock and cattle, which is quite a reduction. The duty on horses was \$30 a head when the valuation was less than \$150, and 30 per cent. ad valorem when valuation was higher. Now it is 20 per cent. ad valorem on all. Sheep and horses are the principal stock importations received here from Canada.
