MRS. PITZEL'S STORY.
The Woman Shows Marks of Her Terrible Sufferings
FULLY IDENTIFIES THE PRISONER
Holmes Gazed Fixedly at Her For at Least a Minute.

Detailed Statement of the Way in Which the Prisoner Took the Woman From Her Husband—The Journey to Detroit and Then to Toronto—The Story Told Her About the Children and How the Woman Overcame During the Trying Ordeal.

Philadelphia, Oct. 30.—The third day of the Holmes trial opened promptly at 10 o'clock this morning. Holmes came in with the usual half smile upon his face that he has worn since morning, and saluted the court officers cheerfully.

More people were in the court room this morning than any day yet, and the anticipation of more sensational evidence that has yet been offered.

Holmes had a long consultation with his lawyers last night, and after they were over, he worked with the notes he made yesterday's proceedings.

The first two witnesses called this morning were the two men who had been in the court yesterday to testify to the identity of Pitzel. They gave their evidence quickly and were soon dismissed.

An important witness called was C. L. Perry, assistant to the president of the Fidelity Mutual Life Association, the company which Holmes swindled out of \$10,000.

Perry was the man who first worked against the insurance swindler, and it was he who first identified the prisoner as the man who had led to his trial for murder.

Mr. Perry identified the insurance policy for \$10,000 taken out in November, 1888, by Pitzel, and the name of Jephtha D. Howe, the St. Louis attorney, acknowledging the payment of the money. The policy was taken out on September 24, 1884, 22 days after Pitzel's death.

Mr. Perry told the court that he had visited Holmes, Howe and Alice Pitzel to the office of the insurance company prior to the visit to Potter's field to exhum the body.

On the occasion Howe and Holmes acted towards each other as ordinary strangers do who have just been introduced to each other.

THE TOTTING MAIL

Tumbling Down to a One-Cent Paper.

A "DEATHBLOW" TO THE WORLD

Journalistic Vagaries and Murders.

The Greatest and Weakest Confession Ever Made by a Toronto Paper—The Final Experiment of The Empire to Be Rejected by the Mail—The World Has Been Deceived, the Mail Out of Its Circulation, Its Best Features and the Recognition of the Public.

A remarkable epoch in the history of Canadian journalism will be reached in a few days, when The Daily Mail and Empire, which for a quarter of a century past has maintained a foremost place among the leading dailies of the continent, will be put into the hands of the reading public in the form of a weekly copy.

The more immediate effects are less easy to ascertain; one thing, however, is certain, that by this action a death blow will be dealt to The Toronto World. This morning's paper is a copy of the Mail, and is only by virtue of its cheapness in price, cannot be considered a struggle with a formidable opponent.

The above remarkable statement was printed in the 5 o'clock edition of The World, and for some reason or other withdrawn from its last edition. It is the most significant and important tribute that has ever been paid to The Mail, and it is a tribute that is well deserved.

Their first move, namely, wherein they disposed of C. C. Patterson, the present postmaster of Toronto, of The Mail newspaper, was a matter of no little surprise to the conservative at the time. It was done without a minute's notice, and had been arranged in more ways than one.
