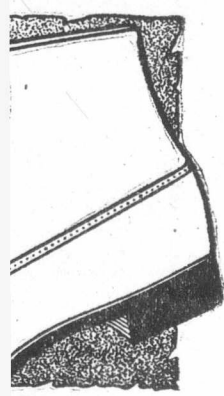

The Situation of the Trade in Small Seeds

Red clover seed will be very scarce
and high in price. Farmers every-
where should be interested in the
situation of small seeds. The price
of alsike, alfalfa, sweet clover and
timothy seed will be relatively high
with red.

See what the Toledo market, one
of the main world markets quotes on
Aug. 25 for December deliveries. For
red clover \$30, for alsike \$25.05,
for timothy \$5.70 per bushel.

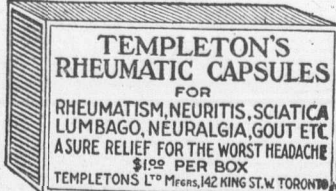
It seems too bad this year to see
cattle eating off fair to goodred clover
prospects in Central and Eastern
Ontario. Be sure there is little or
no seed in the second growth clover
before turning stock in it. Eliminate
as far as possible the weed seed dan-
ger by cutting, pulling or picking
them out of the seed crop when
practical. Don't cut the killed out
or thin spots, where foxtail, ragweed,
mustard and other weeds common
and noxious are most prevalent.

Thresh a lot of hay which matured
timothy seed and in many cases als-
like and red clover seed as well,
throughout Eastern and Northern
Ontario where alsike grew like a
weed this year. The fodder will not
be injured for feeding and good money
may be made from the sale of the
seed. Most other weed seeds may be
separated.

Some provision will be made for
getting the threshing done by prop-
erly fitted machines that will do the
work satisfactorily where there is
enough seed worth while and three
weeks or one month's threshing
would be worth while.

The Ontario Department of Agri-
culture will, I understand, send free
of charge, on application, experts to
fit the ordinary threshing machines
for threshing the small seeds and will
locate where second hand hullers are
available.

Canadian Egg Laying Contests Popular

The Egg Laying Contests throughout
the Dominion are attracting considerable
interest. Already the entries are being
rapidly filled by birds from all classes
of poultry breeders. The fancier and the
commercial man are being represented
as are also the backyarder and the farmer
the old breeder and the amateur. Can-
adians are not going to have it all their
own way either for both the United
States and England are going to be re-
presented.

The Dominion Experimental Farm is
conducting no less than seven contests
this year reaching from Prince Edward
Island on the East to Alberta on the
West. At Ottawa will be held the
"Canadian" open to the world. Other
contests will be conducted at six of the
Branch Farms throughout the Dominion.
The farms selected are Charlottetown,
P. E. I., Nappan, N. S., Cap Rouge,
Que., Brandon, Man., Indian Head,
Sask., and Lethbridge, Alta.

All contests start November first and
continue for 52 weeks. Application must
be made to Dominion Poultry Husband-
man, Experimental Farm, Ottawa. The
time of receiving applications has been
extended to October 15th.
