Miss Grace Jefferson went to Windsor on Friday. Mrs. A. MacMahon and infant son are the guests of her mother, Mrs. West.

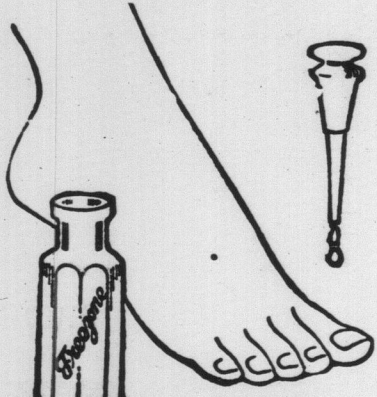

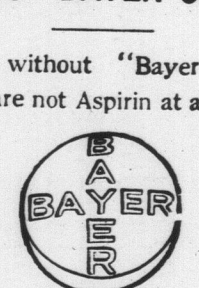
