HILLGROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

The Hillgrove Baptist Church of the Digby pastorate was reopened last Sunday after extensive repairs and alterations, including the addition of a spire. The rededication service was held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the regular pastor presiding. Rev. J. H. Copeland, of Weymouth, offering the prayer and Rev. Clyde W. Several hundred people were present at the services and over \$800 was received, completing the payment of over \$2,500 repairs.
