Charles McMillan.

In the West Toronto Junction Daily Tribune of Aug. 18th appeared the following obituary :-

Dien.-At West Toronto Junction, on Sunday, August 17th, Charles Mc-Millan, Esq., in his seventy-third year.

Deceased was a native of Scotland. having been born in the Mull of Cantire, Argylcshire, on Sept. 1th, 1817. removed to Canada, and became pioneer settlers in the township of Erin, Wellington county, When a young man our subject engaged in business as a builder. Later he carried on the milling business, and subsequently turned his attention to farming. He held many public positions in Welling. ton county. Was a Justice of the Peace and has represented the township, of which he was a pioneer, in the County Council. About ten years ago he retired from active work, but con unued to reside on the farm until last year when he removed to this town, taking possession of a residence he had purchased on High Park Avenue. His death was the result of an accident he met with on Wodnesday last. From internal injuries received by falling down stairs, he nover rallied but, surrounded by loving relatives, breathed his last yesterday at about nine o'clock. Deceased had five brothers and four sisters, one sister and two brothers preceding him to the side of the vast majority. Their irreparable loss is mourned by a widow and five sons and five daughters, the youngest of whom passed his twenty first birthday one week ago to day.
