REQUEST FOR INCREASED GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE

Mr. Stanley Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Mr. Speaker, may I direct a question to the Prime Minister. In view of the concern of people engaged in the field of medical and scientific research over the government's cutback in research grants, I wonder whether the Prime Minister, either today or soon, can make a statement to the house as to whether there has been any modification of the cutback program indicated by the Minister of Finance on September 8?

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the hon. member will recallindeed, I know he will because he reminded me of it at lunchtime-that I wrote him on this matter on October 12, at which time I pointed out that the grants for medical research will be increased, not reduced, in the forthcoming year, and will be increased, I think, appreciably. The effect of the policy of reducing government expenditure which has been announced will simply mean that the increase will be somewhat less than the government would otherwise have wanted. As I told my hon. friend at the time, we hope to recapture the additional increases before long.

Mr. Knowles: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Could the Prime Minister some time soon make a more precise statement to the house as to what amounts are involved? Surely he appreciates that these vague generalities are encouraging but we should like something definite.

Mr. Pearson: Mr. Speaker, vague generalities which often occur on orders of the day are made more definite when the estimates are under consideration.

INQUIRY AS TO DISCUSSIONS RESPECTING GEOGRAPHICAL CO-ORDINATES

In the light of recent discussions has the minister any report to give the house with regard to the negotiations which are proceeding to establish a 12-mile limit, and would he report on the progress that has been made in establishing geographical coordinates from which base lines will be drawn defining our territorial seas and our fishing zones?

Hon. Paul Martin (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, with a view to enabling the government to establish straight base lines as soon as possible we had negotiations on Monday. As I indicated to my hon. friend on that day, the negotiating team from the United States was to forward a counter proposal, which we are now considering.
