He showed that a similar request had been made by the government, then in opposition, in 1894, when the Ross administration was asked to show the detailed receipts of the Tudhope Book "The Car Ahead" asked to show the detailed receipts and expenditures of the T. and N.O.

"Were the returns brought down?" asked Hon. Thomas Crawford.
"They certainly were," replied Mr "Well, I think I would be justified in saying that they were not," replied the member for West Toronto.

Swallow Everything.
"We have got to swallow every statement or information the government is willing to give, and we seem to have to do it holus bolus," said Mr. Clarke.
