Editor World: Due to lack of know ledge of the situation, a number of newspapers have criticized the action of our company in advising its employes that they would be unable to open the factories, in Toronto and open the factories, in The this year after stocktaking. We had not thought it expedient, or desirable, either in the interests of our own company or the general business interests of the community, to make any public state-ment regarding the effect of the war upon our business. We did, however, think it due our employes that they should know the situation, and the following notice was posted on our works notice board on Aug. 11: To the employes of the Toronto

works: "The present season's manufacturing program will be completed on or about Saturday, the 22nd inst., when the works will be closed for our annual "Until the outbreak of the war it

had been our expectation to begin manufacturing for 1915 season about the usual time (Oct. 1). "The effect of the war is so wide-

spread that during its continuance we cannot hope for further business in Europe, and must, therefore, reduce our output accordingly. You will appreciate what this means when we say that about one-half of the output of the works, during the season just closing, was for European countries.

"As the shutdown may last for several months, we are stating frankly the situation the company finds itself in, so that employes who can may se-cure employment elsewhere during the

"We need scarcely say that we regret exceedingly the necessity for this, the first shutdown in 15 years." The percentage of our business dur-

ing the past year in European countries, as above stated, was about onehalf of our total output, nearly all of it in those countries now at war. Immediately the war broke out every order we had in hand from Europe was canceled by cable, including some for which the goods were already manufactured, or in process of manufacture.

In addition to Europe we had foreign business in Australia, New Zea-land, South America and South Africa. We have always felt that the widespread character of our business ensured unusual stability as against luctuating crops or commercial condi-This has often been demonstrated, and particularly during the last two years, when most industries in Canada have been employing a smaller number of men than usual and many running on short time, while our company has given steady employment to a larger number of men than ever be-fore in its history. Our company does not seck publicity, and makes the above statement reluctantly, and only because we feel it necessary to do so in view of the very unfair criticisms made upon it by some of the newspapers, who have not realized that already our company has been more directly affected by the war than any other in Canada.


