

FAIR WAGE CLAUSE UPHELD BY COURT

Rogers' Application to Prevent City From Invoking It is Refused.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday Mr. Justice Middleton dismissed with costs the action brought by the Rogers Supply Company and Alfred Rogers for an injunction restraining the city from invoking in its contracts the fair wage clause.

The company tendered for the supply of crushed limestone to the city and the tender was accepted. It was struck out owing to the fact that they struck out the fair wage clause. His lordship stated he would give his reasons for refusing the injunction later.

Mr. Justice Middleton, while protecting the magistrate who convicted the C.P.R. and fined the company \$2 and costs for violation of Ottawa's smoke by-law, ordered the company to be quashed without costs. His lordship held that the railway is not subject to the municipal by-law or to the regulations of the Dominion Railway Board. The action was based on the objection to the city to continuous smoke coming from the company's roundhouse.

GOVERNMENT SURE TO IMPOSE NEW MOTOR TAX

Scale of Fees Adapted to Power of Cars Will Be Enforced.

Despite the announcement in a motoring magazine to the effect that motor taxes would not be raised in Ontario for 1915 the license fees will be higher, and men who now own cars will pay considerably more for the privilege. This was the information gained from the government last evening, and also plans are not complete yet the intention is to carry out the suggestion of the highways commission by this means a new source of revenue. The change, however, will not go into effect at the New Year when the licenses are issued under ordinary circumstances. It is likely that none will be sent out at the appointed time, but that all will be held back until the new arrangements are complete.

It is possible that instead of this plan the government may issue short-term licenses to expire at the end of the first six months. Others will then be issued carrying the new rates.

It has been estimated that the minimum charge next year will be six or eight dollars with a scale of prices adapted to the power of the various cars.

PUBLISHING FIRM HAS MADE AN ASSIGNMENT

War Forces Bell and Cockburn, Young Firm, to Close.

The youngest publishing firm in Canada, Bell & Cockburn, 210 Victoria street, has been forced to make an assignment, because of the war. They organized less than three years ago and opened by publishing the works of some of the foremost writers in Canada. S. B. Gundy of the Oxford University Press has decided to add one of the partners, W. C. Bell, to his staff at once, and John Henry, who has been acting as western traveler, will also become a member of the Oxford staff.

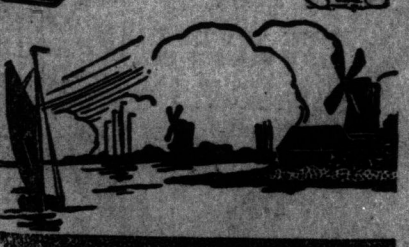

DOVERCOURT LAND BUILDING & SAVINGS

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person before the District Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after obtaining the homestead. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm or in a village.

A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$300 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after purchasing homestead; also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$300 per acre.

Duties—Settler must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300. A bill of divorce from his wife, Pearl Eva, of the City of Toronto, County of York, Province of Ontario, on the ground of adultery.
