



THE NIAGARA RIVER AND QUEENSTON FROM BROCK'S MONUMENT ON THE HEIGHTS

Below Queenston Heights, which holds the monument erected by the British Government to commemorate the services of Sir Isaac Brock, lies the beautiful village of Queenston, Canada, on the Niagara River, opposite the American village of Lewiston, New York. From the heights the road circles down the side of the mountain to Queenston, passing a tablet erected by the Prince of Wales to mark the spot where Brock fell, thence to the river's edge and the dock of the Niagara Navigation Company, whose steamers ply the lower river and Lake Ontario to Toronto. The view from this point is very beautiful. In the estimation of the Duke of Argyll the view from Brock's Monument was worth crossing the Atlantic to behold. The trip to Queenston by trolley forms one of the most popular Niagara journeys, which most fully illustrates the new order of things and the revolution in transportation methods wrought by electricity. What, before the advent of this new order of things, would have been a journey of time and much expense, can now be accomplished quickly and at an expense of but a half dollar. The route extends along the very edge of the gorge, introducing one to views which would be impossible by any other conveyance.
