are in a ftate of infanity, and that every thing done by them in that condition against their interest or inclinations, will be interpreted void, and by no means obligatory on them. If they had taken thefe things into confideration, their conduct must have been of a different nature; but as the die is caft, and things must take their course, I hope that the wifdom of the British councils, the unanimity of our people, the bravery of our troops, and the thunder of our ships, will teach them this leffon, that this great kingdom is at all times able to maintain its honour, and to chaftize, with becoming refentment, the folly of her fons, and the infolence of all their abettors.
