CITY HELD NEGLIGENT FOR NEWMAN'S DEATH

Did Not Provide Ample Appliances to Handle Heavy Coil of Wire.

Coroner Young's jury last night found that John Newman came to his death while in the employ of the City of Toronto, at 41 West Wellington street, by a coil of cable falling on him, and that the City of Toronto was guilty of negligence in its employees in failing to provide suitable appliances for moving such cables.

The evidence went to show that two linemen, Sam Corbett and the deceased, volunteered to assist Ernest Pledger and Alex Quarrington to move the heavy coil, as they were anxious to get the cable off the platform. Pledger's rig was 15 inches lower than the warehouse landing, and a single plank ten inches wide and two inches thick was used to run the coil down to the wagon level. The coil remained flat on the plank until it reached the side of the wagon. Newman and the coil fell together, the weight of the 1600 pounds of cable crushing the man's head.

Alex. Quarrington stated that he asked Newman if everything was all right, and received the reply, "Yes, let her go."

Other and larger coils had been loaded in a similar way before.

Arthur Sawyer, who is in charge of the warehouse, gave instructions to move the reel, and said that two larger coils had been handled in the same way, but in the case of wider reels two planks had to be employed.

ELECTRIC MERGER HAS BIG PLANS FOR RADIALS

Lines to be Constructed for Districts Not Already Served Between London and Niagara.

LONDON, April 12.—Malcolm J. Kent, a director of the London Electric Co. this afternoon gave the first definite statement regarding a merger which may mean a change of management for the London Street Railway Company.

Mr. Kent stated that an option has been given on the street railway. This has not been taken up as yet, but the deal, he said, likely will be closed one way or the other within a week.

Mr. Kent did not feel himself in a position to state definitely the purpose of the proposed change. But he gave this general idea.

The movement here is but one movement of many which aim to bring street railways and radials of a number of places under one management. When this is done the districts between here and Niagara which are not already served by radials will have such lines constructed. These and others always brought in will get their power from the one company.

The merger, it is believed, is but the starting point of the movement which will give the power to the companies, behind which are Mackenzie and Mann, and a number of New York capitalists, a market for their power, and will enable the companies to serve the people along the transmission lines which will be erected.

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NO INCREASE IN PREFERENCE TO BRITAIN

quently I have from time to time decided that there is anything in this agreement to prevent us from increasing the preference if we desire to do so. It was in that sense that I sent the telegram to Lord Strathcona.

"I do not agree," continued Mr. Fielding, "that changes were fore-shadowed in that telegram. At the time I introduced the agreement I said that it might be necessary to make some changes. I repeat that statement to-day. But let me say at once that, if such changes are made, they will be in small matters, and they will not include an increase in the preference to 50 per cent.

We have told the farmers we are asked for free agricultural implements. We cannot grant them that, and we are going to persuade them that that is not the best interests of the country. At present, they have asked for an increase in the preference to 50 per cent, and we are going to tell them that we cannot make that change, that the manufacturers of Canada cannot be carried on if that is done. As to the question of making, because it would be a disturbing influence, while reciprocity will have no disturbing influence (opposition laughter) but will work for the general advantage of Canada."

C. L. Owen (East Northumberland) asked the census enumerators were appointed on merit, and referred to the statement that when the census was taken in 1901 the Quebec returns were found to be stuffed.

Hon. Sydney Fisher replied that the enumerators were supposed to be educated sufficiently to understand their instructions.
