The Toronto Soccer Team Missed Many Chances Against Bethlehem

James Kelly Says Draw Would Have Been Fitting Result on the Play in Game That Was Contested in the Rain on Soggy Field at Harrison, N.J.

Harrison, N.J., Nov. 17.—The champion Bethlehem Steel Co. defeated the picked soccer team from Toronto here today by 4 to 1 before 4000 people. The visit of the Canadians aroused tremendous interest among all soccerists in and around this district, and a large crowd was expected to turn out to see the game, which was played for the benefit of the funds of the United War Work campaign, but the weather turned spiteful, a steady rain falling all day, which had a marked effect upon the gate receipts. Those who braved the elements were well rewarded by seeing a rousing game.

The national champions took the field without their forwards, Easton, who was sick. The Canadians were given a great reception upon showing themselves. Bethlehem won the toss and Forsythe kicked off. The ground was in bad shape, the water being under water. The visitors immediately made tracks for Duncan, but Fletcher and Ferguson pulled them up short.
