CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS FROM VARIED CAUSES

Runaway and Falls Cause Minor Injuries to Several Unfortunates in 24 Hours.

Michael Eaton, 45 years, 21 Walton-street, suffered a broken rib and slight injuries to his back as a result of an 11-foot fall from a wall at the corner of Wellington and Bay-streets at 2:40 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was removed to St. Michael's Hospital in the police ambulance.

A Broken Leg. Alex. Murphy, 35 years, 38 Stafford-street, driver for J. B. Smith & Co., has a compound fracture of his left leg as a result of a fall from his wagon yesterday afternoon. Murphy was driving south over the 2nd Glen Road bridge at 6 o'clock last evening when his wagon was overtaken by a runaway team and wagon, from which Robert Whitney, 28 Parliament-street, had been thrown. The rear wheel of his own wagon passed over Murphy's leg. Dr. Scadding attended him on the spot and he was removed to the General Hospital in the police ambulance.

CAMP AT PETAWAWA.

Artillery Will March From Toronto—Those Who Will Attend.

OTTAWA, April 19.—The arrangements for the camp this year at Petawawa are about complete.

General Otter will be in command. A battery of R.C.H.A. will march to the camp from Kingston and arrive June 10; B Squadron, R.C.D., and B Battery, R.C.H.A., will march from Toronto, the battery by about June 10 and the squadron by Aug. 1. A Squadron, R.C.D., will march from St. John's, Que.

This is to give them opportunity for outpost and reconnoitering practice. Six hundred men of the R.C. Regiment of Infantry will be at Petawawa for three weeks in August. Two hundred and fifty will be drawn from London, Toronto, Quebec and Fredericton, and 300 from Halifax.

Tactical work will be held for three or four days between Aug. 1 and 15.

A Day for the Big Guns. B Battery, R.C.H.A., will fire a salute at the closing of the legislature at 2:30 this afternoon.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

NO SIGNS OF "GRAFT" IN HANDLING OF COAL

Report of Weights is Most Satisfactory—Sewer Pipe Bought on Better Terms.

HAMILTON, April 19.—(Special.)—The civic fuel committee was much pleased this evening with the report of Secretary Kent on the tonnage of coal handled by the committee. It showed that in soft coal the weights did not hold out, and that there was a shortage of 140 tons, or \$335 worth of coal in four years. As to hard coal, the weights more than held out, and there was a surplus of 27 tons. Chairman Allen thought the statement would indicate that there has been no graft in the handling of coal.

Mrs. Dorothy Mayhew, Highfield, was struck by a Dundas car this evening at Bay and Herkimer-streets and had one foot badly crushed.

As a result of competition, the city was able to buy its supply of sewer pipe at a much better price this year than it has for several seasons. The Hamilton and Toronto Sewer Pipe Co. got the contract, but not at the fancy prices of previous years. E. J. Guest got the lime contract at 18c a bushel. The government will be asked to pay part of the cost of continuing the Catherine-street sewer to the new street wall. Burrows, Stewart & Milne got the contract for castings at \$24. a hundred.

There were 542 on parade at the weekly drill of the 11th Regiment this evening. Majors Herring and Labatt, who have served 20 years, were presented with long service medals.

Prof. T. J. Birch delivered an address this evening before the Citizens' League on the making of a nation. He advised the putting down of graft and advised that steps be taken to assimilate the foreign element.

The harbor and beach committee this evening decided to ask council for authority to dig out the sandbar in front of the city dock.

No time to Appeal. Owing to the fact that the time in which an appeal may be taken has elapsed, the license department will not be able to appeal against Judge McKee's decision in the Condon and Barker liquor cases, in which the conviction for obstructing the police was sustained because the offence was committed personally by the hotelman.

FEDERAL DEPT. OF MINES.

Mr. Foster Thinks Provinces Should Be Allowed to Possess.

OTTAWA, April 19.—(Special.)—Mr. Templeman today brought up his bill to establish the department of mines. There was some running discussion part of which was god-awful natured. Mr. Templeman himself, who it is known will assume the new portfolio. Mr. Foster foresaw an increased expenditure, but what was to be gained by it? The geological survey was already in excellent shape. As to mining, did Ontario and the other provinces control their own mines? True, the coal lands in Alberta were under federal control. But would it not be better to turn over their own mineral resources to the prairie provinces? Considerable progress was made with the bill at the evening session. It was stated that the Director of the Geological Survey is to be the deputy minister. Eugene Haanel will have charge of the Bureau of Mines.

The house then took up the resolution authorizing a loan of \$5,078,000 to the Quebec Bridge Company. The resolution was passed and the bill was introduced accordingly, which may meet with considerable opposition. The Hamilton Radial Railway bill was also under discussion. Premier Whitney has telegraphed protesting against the former bill.

HOUSES FOR SICK WARDS

TENANTS ASKED TO MOVE. St. Michael's Hospital, Overtaxed, to Use Property Acquired Without Loss of Time.

The plans of the trustees of St. Michael's Hospital for extending the present building on a broad scale, are not likely to be held back pending the giving by the city of the grant requested.

"We are not relying on what the city may give us. We get \$10 by subscription for every dollar given us by the city," said Hugh T. Kelly of the board of trustees in discussing the situation last night.

Mr. Kelly, when asked if the report was true, that tenants of houses adjoining the hospital on Bond-street and Victoria-street had been notified to vacate, said that such notice had been given, but that it was not the intention to remove the tenants from the hospital for the extensions to be made.

The leases held would not expire coincidentally, and it was intended that as the houses fell into the hands of the hospital they might be used to give accommodation for patients. At present, St. Michael's is much overtaxed and the relief to be afforded will be very welcome. The two houses immediately adjoining the hospital to the north, on Bond-street, are now being used in this way for temporary patients.

representative would meet today and that the companies had agreed that the matter be referred to one board and suggesting that the withdrawal of the notices by the mine owners might relieve the situation.

Mr. Lemieux added that John Mitchell had refused to sanction a strike under any circumstances unless the mine owners agreed to submit their claims to arbitration.

R. L. Borden asked how many men were on strike. It was reported that 10,000 men had walked out. Why did not the government enforce the law? Mr. Borden suggested that the government should take coal lands and operate the mines. Give Province a Chance.

W. F. Maclean (South York) was heartily in favour of public ownership and the operation of the great utility. If the federal government was not willing to undertake this, then let the coal lands be turned over to the respective provinces and let the provincial government furnish cheap fuel to the west. He pointed out, however, that it was useless for the government to control the coal mines unless they also owned and operated the railways.

Hon. Mr. Oliver agreed that the problem was essentially a problem of transportation. During the Lethbridge strike he had investigated complaints as to the car supply and coal output. The mine owners assured him that they could not get cars. One company answered that they had been furnished eight cars in ten days, while they required five cars per day. Another company had only had cars two days out of the month. A third mine closed down half the time for want of cars.

Can't Get Cars. One prominent company declared that the railways would only handle 500 tons of coal per day from its mine, although its ordinary output was 1900 tons a day, which could be increased to 2500.

Another operator could only get cars to move 800 tons a month, although his output was 45,000 tons. Still another company during last January could only get the railways to carry 700 tons a day, although his output for the month was 15,000 tons. "The railway companies could or did only haul the output of 1-1/2 days during the month."

Mr. Oliver pointed out that this during the severe coal famine last winter the coal companies were able, anxious and willing to furnish all the coal demanded by the public, but there was no way to get it to them.

The supply of coal was solely due to a lack of transportation that was at the bottom of the labor trouble. The operators were willing to pay very high wages, from \$3 to \$7 a day, but they could only pay the miners when they worked, and there could be no regular work or any living wages, unless there were transportation facilities for the coal when it was mined.

R. L. Borden could not understand why the coal could not be stored. Mr. Oliver said that this was impracticable. Mr. Blain (Peel) said that enormous quantities of coal were stored every summer in Ontario, so as to prepare for winter.

Mr. Oliver said that there was no accumulated capital in the west. Everything waited upon the sale of the annual crop. Mr. Foster (North Toronto) thought that the people of the Northwest were to blame for not laying up coal before winter.

Mr. Roche (Liberal, Halifax) to some extent agreed with Mr. Foster. He could not understand why the dealers did not store up coal in the warm weather. He thought that if the railways were equipped with steel cars it would improve conditions.

Mr. Fielding thought that some of the boards of trade were unduly excited. They proposed violent and hasty remedies, including the calling out of militia. It was the object of this government to prevent, not thru coercion, but thru conciliation.
