D. A. Pringle Condemns Government on Account of Recent Expenses.

CORNWALL, June 23.—(Special.)—There was a large and representative attendance at the annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Cornwall and Stormont at Newington yesterday.

The following officers were elected: President, E. H. McLaughlin; Vice-presidents, D. J. Gillies, Cornwall; Town, W. J. Wood, Cornwall; Township, Charles S. Ault, Ontario; A. O. Miller, Roxborough; Hugh McMillan, Finch Township; J. D. McNaughton, Finch Village; Treasurer, T. Shaver, Lunenburg; Secretary, J. C. Milligan, Cornwall. Resolutions were carried with enthusiasm endorsing Mr. Borden, the Dominion leader, and the Whitney government of Ontario.

The gathering was addressed by R. A. Pringle, M.P., George Kerr, M.L.A., A. R. McLennan, F. McIntyre, M.C., Oscar Fulton, F. D. McNaughton and G. C. Smith.

In Mr. Pringle's address was an arraignment of the Dominion government in connection with the "shameful wine, women and graft" exposures. It was decided to hold a convention on July 10 to select a candidate for the next Dominion election.

MR. PUGSLEY QUILTS.

Prosecution in Libel Case Will Be Conducted by J. K. Barry.

Hon. William Pugsley of St. John, N.B., arrived in Toronto on Sunday morning and returned east in the evening with his daughters, who have been attending a private school here.

He was crown counsel in the prosecution of J. H. Crockett for criminal libel at Fredericton last week, but is said to be fully determined to abandon the case, and J. K. Barry, K.C., will act in his stead.

PAINTERS ACCEPT LESS AND GO BACK TO WORK

Wanted 40 Cents an Hour—Citizens' League Want to Stop Gambling at Race Tracks.

HAMILTON, Ont., June 23.—(Special.)—George Hack, 122 North Catherine-street, was taken to the City Hospital early this morning with a big gash on the side of his neck. According to the information that reached the police the wound was self-inflicted with a razor.

At the hospital to-night the doctors said he would recover.

This afternoon Rev. Canon Abbott, rector of Christ Church Cathedral, preached a special sermon to the Masonic brethren of the district. Over 400 Masons, headed by the Knights Templar, attended the service.

BRAKEMAN SCALDED TO DEATH
Was Pinned Between Locomotive and Tender in Wreck.

OTTAWA, June 23.—(Special.)—William D. Douglas, a G.T.E. brakeman, died in the hospital here to-day after hours of terrible suffering, from injuries he received in a wreck late Saturday night near Eastman Springs.

At the time of the accident he was on the locomotive and while the rest of the trainmen succeeded in jumping and saving themselves, he was pinned between the locomotive and tender and held there for hours with scalding water pouring over him.

With the help of farmers the other trainmen finally released him, but he died shortly after reaching the hospital.

The collision was between a freight train out of Ottawa and a light engine running from Hawkesbury to Ottawa for repairs.

One of the locomotives and three cars were dented, the other locomotive was badly damaged, and the track was torn up for 200 feet.

It was necessary to transfer passengers to cars from Montreal this morning while a wrecking gang were hard at work to-day to repair the damage.
