It requires that Spain surrender her sovereignty over Cuba, or the United States will make an armed intervention and assist the insurgents to throw off the Spanish yoke. Spain will be allowed but a few days in which to frame a reply, and as it is not likely she will relinquish Cuba waris considered inevitable. Immediately on receiving an unsatisfactory reply from Spain, or if the allotted time should expire without Spain's acknowledging the ultimatum, President McKinley will take drastic measures and land an armed force in Cuba. Troops are being mobilized at Tampa, Florida, for this purpose. The 13th Infantry Regiment of the United States regulars left Buffalo for Tampa yesterday, and the 3th Infantry left from Watertown, N.Y. It is proposed to place 200,000 soldiers at the disposal of the Government.
