

When the calculations were made nere it was found that this variation would give Canada that portion of the Porcupine district which includes Porcupine Creek. Innscreek empties into the Kleneni River. The Porcupine Creek section is rich in gold deposits, and the whole Porcupine district is inabited by American citizens.

Besides these advantages to Canada, the Salisbury variation would give Canada control of the navigations of the Porcupine Creek, and also of the navigation of the Kleheni River down to Kluckwan. Had these points been unwittingly ceded to Canada, it would have been easy for Canada to force the United States to grant her the free right of way to the Lynn Canal by the Kleheni River.
