The Butter Trade.

Butter continues to go forward to England in good quantities from this port, 12,341 packages being shipped last week, making the total for the season 137,309 packages, as compared with 56,-957 packages for the corresponding period of last year, showing an increase of 80,352 packages. Sales of September and October make have been made at 19 1-2c to 20c in the country, the latter figure for fancy in boxes. On the other hand, a shipper claims that he bought over 300 packages of September creamery at 19c delivered here. The English market olds steady, notwithstanding the fact that a lot of Australian butter has recently arrived there, and about 12,000 packages more are on the way.-Montreal Trade Bulletin.

The Cheese Trade.

The past week has developed a quieter and slightly easier feeling, which has enabled buyers to fill orders a shade below the top prices demanded a short time ago. Orders from English houses have been less during the week, and well they may, when it is considered that over 300,000 boxes has been shipped to them within the past three weeks. One would imagind it was about time for a pause. Advices from both Liverpool and London agree in stating that supplies in all positions are of a limited character; but it is said that a good deal will depend upon the nature of the Antipodean shipments. Regarding these, however, it is said that they are expected to be very light, owing to the drought and the fact to the production of butter in that quarter of the globe. Regarding the September and October make in Canada, one would imagine it would be large, owing to the good prices at which it has been contracted; and yet there are contradictory reports there-on, some stating that the make of certain factories show a material falling-off as compared with last year, and other factories, it is contended, have made as much cheese as in the fall of 1895. It is believed, however, that owing to the cold fall the make will be below rather than above the average. The exports from this port for the season up to the close of last week were 1,476,380 boxes, against 1,-424,169 boxes for the corresponding period last year, showing an increase of 52,211 boxes; but it should not be forgotten that in place of about 300, 000 boxes in store here a year ago, there is now not over 125,000. Quite a number of orders have recently been received for June and July goods; although at this time last year the market was glutted with them .-
