London, April 25.-In the House of Commons John Dillon, Nationalist member for county Mayo, called attention afresh to the large increase in the British force in the Cape, within a comparatively brief period-an increase which Mr. Balfour, when the matter was brought up last week, said was in no wise intended as a menace to the Transvaal. Mr. Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, answering Mr. Dillon's interpellation, explained that the increase was due to the fact that the Transvaal Government had been making "tremendous military preparations" on the borders of Cape Colony. Henry bouchere, Radical member for North-ampton, reproached the colonial secretary with "following a defiant action by a defiant speech."

St. Louis, April 25.-Gov. Stephens, of Missouri, has been requested by Eph Houston to commute the death sentence of Thomas Shackleford, now in the city jail for the murder of a man

named Taylor. Houston was an attendant at the morgue at the time Taylor's body was brought there, and the doctors who held the post-mortem examination gave him the stomach of the man to set aside. Soon after another dead man was brought to the morgue. There was some doubt as to how he came to die, and on the doctor's order his stomach was also put aside.

Houston says he believes he got the stomachs mixed. Shackleford was convicted of murder in the first degree on the evidence adduced from stomach, which was kept by Houston for the court.

saries to Filipino rebels. Admiral Dewey's dispatches to Secretary Long indicate that he is still in the dark as to the fate of Lieut. Gilmore and the fourteen captured sailors of the Yorktown at Baler.

Several ex-Spanish army officers in Cuba are said to have begged Gen. Brooke to accept their services to fight the rebels in the Philippines, offering to raise a regiment of their compatriots. Col. Remie and Major Lasseras, Spanish commissioners, tried to enter Aguinaldo's lines near Calumpit to treat for the release of Spanish prisoners, but were compelled to return, not being able to get past the outposts, who threatened to fire on the flag of

truce carried by the commissioners. IN FRONT OF CALUMPIT. Manila, April 25-10:30 a.m.-Although the sticky condition of the ground, due to a rainstorm, seriously impeded its progress, Gen. Lawton's column left San Jose today, and is expected to reach Norzagary this evening. Col. Summers is marching across from Bocave, with two battlions, each from the Oregon and Minnesota Regiments, three troops of cavalry and two guns. the meantime Gen. MacArthur's divi-sion is in front of Calumpit, preparing to attack the rebel stronghold, and Gen.

Hale, with several guns, is threatening the enemy's flank. A few rebels between Novaliches and La Loma have persistently interfered with telegraphic communication, but the signal corps has repaired the breaks and captured several prisoners. A small body of rebels at Taktay was discovered this morning by the armored launch Napidan. A few shots scattered the rebels and drove them inland from the lake. All is quiet along Gen. Hale's and Gen. Ovenshine's lines

FIFTY FILIPINOS KILLED. A dispatch to the New York Herald from Manila says: The movement of the American forces on Calumpit has begun, Gen. Hale's brigade crossing the river at Quingua and moving down the bank of the river toward Calumpit. Many insurgents were driven from in front of the line of march. Fifty of the enemy were killed, while the American loss was only one killed. It is reported that Gen. MacArthur, with Lawton's brigade and an armored train, is waiting at Malolos, for the strategic moment for an advance on Calumpit. This advance from Malolos is momentarily expected to begin. The town of Malolos will be evacuated, only the railway sta-tion being held. The natives are re-turning there in great numbers. All are professed non-combatants. army gunboats, being unable to ascend the river to co-operate in the movement on Calumpit, have returned to Manila.

MET FIERCE OPPOSITION. Washington, D. C., April 25 .- The following has been received at the war department from Gen. Otis: Manila, April 25.—Adjutant-general, Washington: Hale's brigade, MacArthur's division, moved down the right bank of Quingua River yesterday to the vicinity of Calumpit; now joined by Wheaton's brigade on the left bank. Hale encountered fierce opposition, driving the enemy with heavy loss, taking his entrenchments in flank. Hale's casualties, six killed, thirteen wounded. The division has now invested Calumpit, which will be taken today. #### **MUCH ADO** ABOUT NOTHING

Capt. Coghlan's After-Dinner Remarks Create a Breeze-The Incident

Not Considered Serious. Berlin, April 25.-The afternoon newspapers here contain few comments upon Capt. Coghlan's remarks, and they generally take a calm view of the after-dinner speech and consider the incident closed, particularly in view of the semi-official note published here announcing the strong disapproval of United States Secretary of State John Hay with the captain's conduct, coupled with the dignified tone of the American press on the subject.

NOT SERIOUS. Washington, April 25 .- After the conference between Secretary Hay and the German ambassador, it was stated in an authoritative quarter that there was no reason to view the Coghlan affair in too serious a light, or as presenting grave international complica-tions. The meeting, it was stated, had been mutually agreeable. The main feature of the state department conference was in establishing that Germany expects the United States Government to deal with the Coghlan affair, according to the gravity of the offense, and the United States in return gives assurance that every just
