Amendment to Superannuation Bill.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 22 .- The teachers uperannuation bill, with a number of amendments, occupied the time of the Legislature for a couple of hours tonight. Hon. Dr. Pyne, in answer to questions, stated that the total salaries were \$9,500,000, and with the teachers paying 21/2 per cent and the province 21/2 per cent that would make an annual contribution of \$475.000 to the fund.
