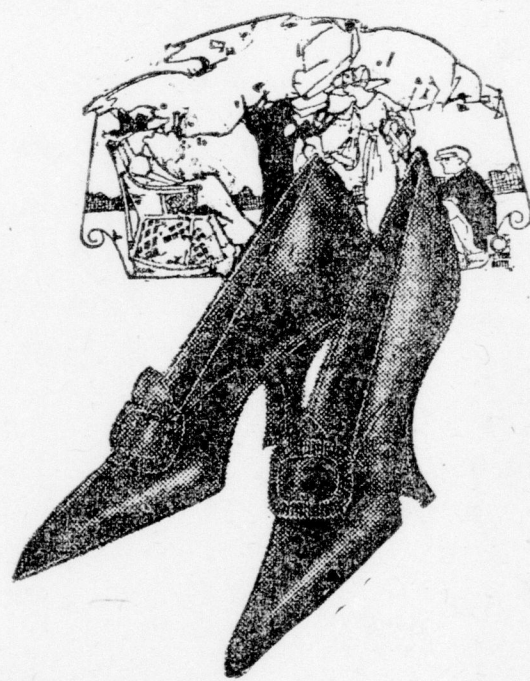

GERMANS WILL ASK FOR EXTENSION OF TIME, BUT ARE EXPECTED TO SIGN

Foch Extends Command Over Czechs, Rumanian and Polish Forces For United Front If Need Be.

PARIS, June 19.—(By the Associated Press).—Advices received in American peace circles in Paris indicate that there may be a change in the personnel of the German peace delegation and that a short extension of the time-limit for signing the treaty may be requested by the Germans, but that the Germans will sign the treaty.

FOCH DRAWING RING AROUND GERMANY.

PARIS, June 19.—(Havas dispatch).—Marshal Foch is forming one front against the Germans from the Rhine to the Danube. The Intransigent says it is formed. The Allied commander-in-chief will henceforth extend his command over the Czech-Slovak, Rumanian and Polish forces, it says.

Assembly May Order Plebiscite; Advocates of Signing Gaining

BERLIN, June 19.—Via Copenhagen.—The German National Assembly will make its final decision on the peace treaty Saturday, according to private advices here from Weimar. In all probability, it is said, the assembly will decide to order that a plebiscite be taken.

If the German National Assembly orders a plebiscite on the peace treaty Saturday, the voting will have to be done so that the German answer can reach the Allies in Paris by 4:30 p.m. Monday, Paris time, unless the Germans should request, and the Allies grant, a further extension of time in which to answer the amended peace treaty.

Late in April it was reported from Berlin that the Government had all preparations for an election in readiness for a plebiscite on the peace terms. At that time sources close to the German Government claimed that such an election could be completed throughout Germany in 48 hours. The question of a plebiscite in Germany, however, has not since been raised.

Since the revolution in November all important elections in Germany have been held on Sunday.

SENATE REAFFIRMS ATTITUDE TOWARDS PROHIBITION BILL

It Is Almost Certain That
Commons Will Refuse
To Concur.

OTTAWA, June 19.—The position of the Senate on the prohibition measure was reaffirmed today. The Government leader, Sir James Loughheed, moved that the amendment of Wednesday cutting off the provision that the measure shall continue for twelve months after the termination of the war, should not be concurred in. This was defeated by 38 to 26. The bill, as amended, was read the third time, and will go to the Commons that the elected members may consider the amendment.

It is almost certain that the Commons will refuse to concur in the Senate's amendment, and a conference between members of the two houses may result. If the will of the Senate prevails, then on the signing of peace, the embargo against the importation of liquor from outside Canada, against the manufacture of liquor within Canada and against interstate trade will be lifted. Jurisdiction will remain wholly with the provinces, with the Doherty act on the statute books to permit any province to prohibit the entry intended for a purpose which is deemed illegal in such province.

COMMITTEE WANTS MILLION SPENT ON ONTARIO ELEVATOR

Recommendation Will Be Subject of Discussion in Commons.

OTTAWA, June 19.—The agricultural committee of the House of Commons has brought in a recommendation in favor of the construction of an inter-lake elevator in Ontario. The committee declares that a sum not exceeding \$1,000,000 should be placed in the supplementary estimate to provide for it.

A. F. OF L. CONSIDERS INJUNCTIONS WRONG

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 19.—The American Federation of Labor, in a resolution adopted at its convention here today, condemning what were declared to be "unjustified" by the judiciary of the Government's legislative and executive powers, recommended that organized labor should disregard injunctive decrees of courts on the ground that such decrees violated the rights guaranteed under the constitution.

HIGHGATE PASTOR IS PRESENTED WITH CHECK

HIGHGATE, June 19.—Rev. J. B. Falconer, B. A., of Rodney, occupied the pulpit in St. James' Church, Thamesville, on Sunday. At the close of the evening service Dr. A. M. Boyd, the former pastor, was asked to come to the platform, while Dr. Stewart, with a few words of appreciation, presented him with a substantial check. Dr. Boyd, in replying, said that his sojourn in Thamesville had been a very pleasant one. He urged the congregation to co-operate with his successor in making the church a mighty influence for good and spoke of the advantage of organization.

LIBERTY LEAGUE FORMED AT BORDER TO BUCK WORK OF LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

WINDSOR, June 19.—Opponents of the Lord's Day Alliance have united to form a Liberty League here for the purpose of opposing the efforts of the alliance to check Sunday newspapers, the sale of ice-cream and airplane flights.

Mayor King of Walkerville is acting president of the new organization, and F. M. Scarfe, manager of the local branch of the Merchants' Bank, treasurer. An effort will also be made to force a repeal of the Lord's Day act, it being contended that its rigid observance as adapted to present day life is not only inconsistent but harmful.
