

Commission Probing Disturbances Scores Officials.

DELHI, Ind., March 29.—The special commission appointed by the national congress to inquire into the recent disturbance in the Punjab, has published its report. It says that the commission finds Baron Chelmsford, viceroy and governor-general of India, incapable of holding his high office and demands The report demands that Sir Michael The report demands that Sir Michael O'Dwyer, British Heutenant-governor of the Punjah; General Dyer, commander of the British troops in India; two colonels; Deputy Commissioner Smith, and two individuals should be relieved of their offices. The punishment of certain minor Indian officials is also demanded.

#### WAR STILL ON

OTTAWA, March 29, — (By Canadian Press.) — Answering George Parent (Quebec West) in the Commons this afternoon, Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, stated that the proclamation officially declaring that the war with Germany and Austria and their ailies has ended will be issued "when peace shall have been legally restored with the last of the enemy powers."

The Government has considered the matter of publishing such a proclamation, but the time for such has not yet arrived. Goods from Germany and Austria are not allowed to be received into Canada, Mr. Doherty stated, and the Government is informed that trade is being carried on between the inhabitants of Great Britain, France and the United States and the countries with which peace has been congluded.
