

The steamer left Hailey ury at 8 in the morning with passengers and freight for Temiskaming miles north of Mattawa.

About twenty-five persons we board, including three women, cook and two waitresses. Most of the passengers were men from the lumber camps. As the chill of the northern evening settled down on the lake the passengers gathered in the centre of the beat close-to the tolers, which accounts for the number scalded. Within four miles of the steamer's

destination an explosion occurred, fol-lowed by a rush of hot, scalding steam to all parts of the boat, filling the cabns, which were closed in.
