CITY AND TOWN ARE NOW HAPPILY UNITED

Review of Situation Shows Striking Progress—Findings in Moon Inquest.

To-day the City of Toronto in the acquisition and absorption of the Town of East Toronto, enters upon what will undoubtedly prove a union fraught with the greatest mutual advantage to each of the municipalities.

On account of East Toronto being so delightfully situated, and from its high altitude possessing scenic and sanitary advantages unrivaled among all the outlying suburbs, the city is especially fortunate in the union now so happily consummated.

The history of East Toronto since its incorporation as a town in the year 1888, and subsequent from 1903, when incorporation as a town was effected, has been one of steady progress. This has been especially marked during the last five years. In the improved class of residences, bearing the impress of taste and comfort, the town leaves little as a residential centre to be desired.

Along Municipal Lines.
The first village council was composed of D. G. Stephenson, reeve, and Councillors Benjamin Morton, R. L. Lattrell, Chas. Pickering and Frank Bostwick, and elected in Jan. 1, 1888. One of the first acts of that body was the appointment of F. W. Monteith as clerk at a salary of \$80 a year. The history of the village council from that date to its incorporation as a town in 1903 is fraught with the ordinary vicissitudes of that august body. Associated therewith among others are the names of Dr. W. R. Walters, John Richardson, J. L. McCullough, J. Hawkins, J. Allman, R. Rogerson and others.

Was Made a Town.
The names of few men are given to be more intimately associated with the progress of a town than that of Dr. Walters, who, in 1903 was elected as first mayor, and in 1904 was again by acclamation chosen to the chief magistracy. The transition from the status of a village to that of a town rendered imperative the formation of three wards for which these members were elected: Ward 1—R. L. Boothe, 2—R. G. Kerr, A. McMillan and John Berry, Ward 2—Arthur Johnston, Richard Abbott, and John Richardson. Few of these are, after the lapse of only five years, in public life, as shown by the names of the council of 1908: Mayor, Andrew McMillan; reeve, Jos. Hind; deputy reeve, S. K. Brown; Ward 1, F. M. Baker, O. M. Hodson, F. W. Lynde; Ward 2, J. Berry, T. N. Pheasant, W. Linton; Ward 3, Frank Abbott, George Wixon, A. Johnston.

Good Sign of Official.
In the person of W. H. Clay, for nearly 14 years clerk of the town, and latterly treasurer as well, East Toronto was fortunate. Few men in official life in Ontario to-day have a more thorough grasp of municipal life, and the duties pertaining to the office. Mr. Clay's services in the larger sphere as town assessor and collector G. W. Ormerod for 13 years has given splendid service and possesses a knowledge of land values which will do much to local difficulties.

Easy to Manage.
That the town of East Toronto will bring little increased worry along police lines is evidenced by the fact that the staff comprises two men, Chief Thiberry and Deputy Charles Cobrey. Along ecclesiastical lines the new annex is well provided with churches, no less than eight denominations being represented. They are: Emmanuel Presbyterian, Hope Methodist, St. Saviour's Anglican, St. John's Roman Catholic, East Toronto Baptist, Beach Methodist, St. Alan's Anglican, and the Salvation Army.

A Fine School Service.
With a teaching staff of 31, three splendidly constructed and well equipped school buildings, together with a high school, which has already attained a provincial reputation, the Town of East Toronto has kept pace with the big city to the west.

In Kimberley-avenue school Principal Brown has for 13 years in the position named given splendid satisfaction. Aside from his scholastic attainments, Mr. Brown is an enthusiastic sportsman, being manager of the York football team, Ontario champions. Miss Yeo is principal of Beach school, and Mr. Leitch of Coleman. Principals French is in charge of the high school, with an able staff of assistants.

Shows Great Progress.
The official figures as compiled by Mr. Clay show the remarkable increase in assessed values within the last five years, and briefly summarized are: In 1903 the assessment was \$283,45, and in 1908 \$1,927,345. In 1908 the population of the town was 3573, while the assessment of June places the number at 4781. Building operations show a
