Criticism of the Minister Justice in Resolution Finally Considered to Be Too Strong.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, minister of justice, yesterday came in for some warm scathing in connection with the justice, yesterday came in for some warm scathing in connection with the Skill and King case. East District Methodists at their annual meeting in the Metropolitan Church, considered a resolution which said: "The retention in such a high and influential position of a gentleman holding such views is a serious menace to the best interests of the Canadian people."

Dr. Henry Hough, a personal friend of Mr. Aylesworth for over 30 years, while he heartily agreed with the sentiment of the resolution, was decidedly averse to the dictatorial character of the clause quoted. Rev. Mr. Cobourn state that he had heard it said that the greatest handicap to moral reform work in this country was the minister of justice. The clause was erased.

Another resolution was unanimously passed, opposing all kinds of gambling, and that of the race track in particular. On motion of the Rev. H. W. Locke, it was decided that the chairman of the district should visit all churches where the pastor is receiving a salary of less than \$1000, and urge that it be increased to this amount.
