SEEK SUBSTITUTE FOR LUXURY TAX

Leading Montreal Organizations Arrange Meetings to Hear Suggestions.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—The abolition of the luxury tax is being earnestly considered by many Montreal organizations, who recognize, however, that the government must have revenue, and who are anxiously seeking a tax to replace it, without the recognized faults of the luxury tax. The members of the council of the Montreal Board of Trade, it is stated by J. Stanley Cook, secretary, have the matter under consideration, and will, at their meeting tomorrow receive a report on the opinions of prominent reallers as to the faults or advantages of the luxury tax, together with suggestions for a tax to replace it. A similar conference is being held next Tuesday afternoon in the board room of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, Montreal branch.

Methods Suggested.

Amongst methods suggested so far, merchants favor two schemes. The first is a one per cent, tax on the turnover of all retaillers. The other suggestions, which meets better the desires of retaillers, is to increase the present sales tax of one per cent, on manufacturers, and wholesalers by a quarter of one per cent. It is thought that the latter suggestion would be better. If it is put in force, it is said that the imports tax of two per cent. would have to be correspondingly realsed.
