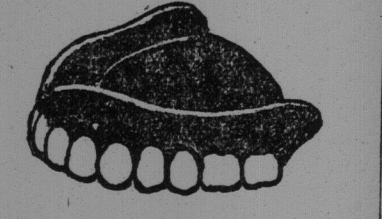

The rig was hired from Mr. Steeves' livery stable on Sunday and when returned the horse was in a very exhausted condition. During the night the beast died and the owner alleges that it was driven to death.
