council have any legal right to pass such a by-law locally, and have the right to suspend it till May 20, they must also have the right to suspend it still further during which time let us bend every effort towards getting together, so far as the local situation is concerned.

It is not the intention of this letter to enter into arguments for or against, as that would take all the paper in the office (paper is expensive and scarce), but let it suffice to say that St. John cannot get on without the harmonious support of its surrounding territory, neither can our wholesale trade and manufacturing interests need to do all they can to bring that about.

If St. John were to be a pioneer, still further let us suggest a convention of the maritime provinces at, say, Amherst, to which would be invited: The president of each board of trade in the maritime provinces, the mayor of each city, the warden of each municipality. They should fairly represent the three provinces and if they can agree on the merits of this question, let them endorse it and a small committee of their choice to the dominion house with it, and let the rest of us be willing to abide by their decision. The expense of this convention to be provided by the boards of trade, for their president, the city for its mayor, the municipality for its warden. And surely that will be much cheaper than a plebiscite in several at least of the places where it is sure to come a live issue as time goes on, for there are surely two sides to the question, and it is a question that should be settled by a dominion act.
