Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole owner of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any time. Duties—Six months' residence upon an acquisition of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within limits of his homestead as a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may prevent a quarter section along his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead points) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$150 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
