Asbestos, following yesterday's slight decline, opened unchanged at 85, and then rose a quarter to 85½. Asbestos preferred was steady at 109, its closting figure. Other leaders to receive attention during the first 10 minutes were Consolidated Smelters, off seven-eighths at 119½; Dominion Textile, unchanged at 85½; Penman's unchanged at 158; National Breweries, up a quarter at 52¾; Shawinigan, off a quarter at 166½; and Montreal Power, the same at 208. An interesting old copy of the Angligan prayer book, dated 1829, has been presented to the Natural History Society by Miss Frances Seymour Barnes, of Vancouver, B. C.

The book formerly belonged to C. Seymour, of the Royal Navy, and its donor is a daughter of William and Elizabeth McLean Barnes, formerly of Upham parish, Kings county.

The museum has a very interesting collection of old Bibles and prayer books and this new gift will be a valued addition to the volumes in the collection. But it has another claim to interest for on the flyleaf there is found a sailor's recipe for a remedy that was deemed worthy of preservation on the leaf of his prayer book. 
