BRITISH ARMY TO

Considerable Improvement Over Present Type—Higher Muzzle Velocity.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—Though surprisingly little has been heard of the matter in the House of Commons, the work of re-arming the infantry with a new rifle is already well in hand, and it is hoped to start the issue of this to the troops before the end of the year. The Brigade of Guards will be the first to receive it, and at the present time there is no intention to issue this to the troops of the Indian Native Army. It is claimed by those who are responsible for the new meapon that it will be a considerable improvement on the one at present in use in the army, though this was found to be one of the best used by any army during the war. The system of loading will be practically the same as is in the present weapon, bat the boring of the barrel has been slightly modified and other improvements introduced.

As a result of these it is hoped that the weapon will have a greater muzzle velocity, and, consequently, a flatter trajectory—the great aim in the production of all new rifles.



Two new methods of diagnosing or detecting internal cancer in its early stages are reported from Europe.

While biologists and bi-chemists are working to discover the fundamental nature and cause of cancer, surgeons and physicians are of necessity concerned chiefly with treating cancer when it occurs.

The first method of diagnosis is the work of Dr. Kotzareff and Weyl of Geneva, Switzerland.

They have discovered that if a dilute solution of serum containing radioactive substances in a colloidal or pasty state is injected into a patient suffering from cancer, a peculiar phenomenon takes place. For some unknown reason, all the radio-active substance becomes localized in the cancer growth.

If a sensitive photographic plate is then exposed for some hours over the suspected part of the body, the outline of the cancer is found upon the plate as a result of the action of the radio-active substance,
