Cleveland, April 21.—Interest in the home-coming of the Cleveland Indians today for the first time since they won the world's baseball championship, centres in Riggs Stephenson, star second baseman, who is to make his initial appearance before the home fans. He is leading the regulars at bat with fourteen hits out of twenty-four times up and his fielding has been sensational. Cleveland and St. Louis are scheduled to open the local season. The 11,000 reserved seats have been sold out for weeks.

Mails' Defeat.
Detroit, April 21.—When the Tigers knocked Walter Mails out of the box in Wednesday's game with Cleveland, the Indian southpaw suffered his first defeat since coming to the American League late last season. The records credited Mails with six victories and no defeats until yesterday. It was the second time the Tigers had routed him, the first occasion being in one of the closing series games last season.

White Sox Home Today.
Chicago, April 21.—Preparations were made for a record-breaking crowd at the first home game today of the Chicago White Sox, with the Tigers as opponents. Kerr is slated to pitch for the Sox. Threatening weather may cause postponement.

THEFT OF CLOTH FROM FREIGHT CARS
Is Caught in Pawtucket After Trip to Canada.

Worcester, Mass., April 21.—H. Ellis, twenty-three years of age, of Pawtucket, was arrested here yesterday in connection with the larceny of \$17,000 worth of cloth from freight cars at Manville, R. I. He was boarding a train to return to Providence after a trip to Canada.

Ellis, according to the local police, admitted his part in the robbery and said he and a companion sold the cloth to two men in Providence, who advised him to get out of town. They did so, and remained in Canada until their funds gave out. He telegraphed home for funds and was on his way back when caught here.

SUICIDES IN PRESENCE OF HIS AGED MOTHER
Montreal Man Had Been Out of Work—Throat Cut From Ear to Ear.

Montreal, April 21.—Stabbing himself in the region of the heart and then cutting his throat with a bread knife in the presence of his aged mother, Pierre Peroux, thirty, of 838 Drolet street, died yesterday in the Hotel Dieu Hospital.

The cause is attributed to mental aberration caused by worry induced by lack of employment. He had been out of work for several months. He cut his throat from ear to ear.

USE OF AIRPLANES FOR DOG SMUGGLING
London, April 4.—(Associated Press by Mail).—Dog smuggling by airplane has arrested the interest of the House of Lords which recently devoted part of an afternoon to a discussion of the subject.

The pampered toy-dog was roundly excoriated by a number of their lordships. Lord Willoughby de Broke supporting Lord Redbush in a demand that "such useless brutes" be excluded from the country.

It was pointed out that it is an easy task for a person to smuggle the small lap dog into the country in a muff or basket.

The Minister of Agriculture promised to renew his vigilance in the matter of preventing dog-smuggling and to increase the penalties if necessary.
