PECULIAR PRANKS IN COAL PRICES

How the Fuel Controller's Regulations Affect Retail Prices on Hard Coal.

In discussing the coal situation today an official of the Consumers Coal Co. pointed out a rather peculiar situation in the present price of hard coal. He said, "Formerly prices ran much more uniform, perhaps 25c per ton would cover the difference between the highest and lowest quotations in the city but today prices run all the way from \$15 to \$19.50 for ordinary city delivery. One would expect that with a fuel controller in the States and one in Canada prices in any community would be about equal but such is not the case and the fuel controller's regulations do not tend to that result."

To the cost of the coal landed in St. John the dealer can add only a certain fixed margin set by the fuel controller. This fixed margin must take care of all expenses—rent, taxes, labor, salaries, feed or gasoline, repairs, depreciation, loss on stock, bad debts, insurance, interest, etc. If there is anything left over, he can call it profit. This cost of the coal is averaged twice a month and the dealer is taking the cost of the coal in stock and unsold, and the cost of coal received during the period. If a dealer has little or no stock on hand and has received some comparatively high or low priced coal, his price must take a sudden jump up or down. This explains the peculiar situation today. Some dealers have recently received coal shipped after the 1st of November on which the mine was allowed an advance of \$1.00 per ton. In addition, some of this coal had demurrage against it on account of delay in discharging due to the recent strike of the coal handlers. In our case these two items amounted to \$1.00 and \$1.20 respectively at a time when our former stock was sold out, hence our price jumped suddenly from \$17.25 to \$19.50 with 50c off for cash.

Just about this time last year we were seeing a price of \$1.10 a ton when some other dealers were forced to make an advance. This condition makes things very awkward at times for the dealer as customers are very often prone to forget the purchases at the lower prices, and feel dissatisfied when paying the higher prices. But the dealers cannot very well help matters as they must take the system as laid down by the fuel controller and make or lose friends according to the cost of their coal at the time. Fuel control no doubt prevents some from profiteering and speculating in coal, but it certainly plays some peculiar pranks with prices.

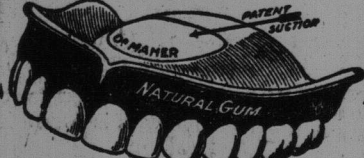
