Go Before Grand Jury.

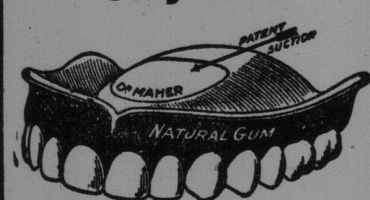
