TURKISH REFORMERS NOT YET SATISFIED

Many Unpopular Officials Have Been Removed

But the People are Clamor for a General Clearing Out of all the Old Crowd—Report of Plot.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 30.—Street demonstrations here have now practically ceased, but public indignation is growing at the delay in removing the obnoxious ministers and other government officials. Many reports are current of the dismissal and flight of various officials, but it is impossible to ascertain the details.

It is confidently expected, that the Minister of Marine, Rami Pasha, has been forced out of office and replaced by Hasan Pasha.

An order issued yesterday appoints Jazet Pasha, President of the Commission for the inauguration of the Hijaz Railway. He will leave Constantinople for that region at once.

It is stated that Zekki Pasha, Inspector of Military Schools, has been dismissed, while Zemin Pasha, Minister of Mines and Forests, has fled with his family to Brindisi. The reformers further demand the dismissal of Tahsin Pasha, one of the chief advisers in the Palace and Abdul Houda, the Sultan's astrologer.

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Mar. Ormanian, the Armenian Patriarch of Constantinople, has resigned. The statement announced that Greek bands everywhere are joining in the movement of conciliation.

HORSE THIEF ATTEMPTS SUICIDE IN JAIL

Stole Outfit From a Barn But Was Captured After an Exciting Chase Through the Streets.

WARREN, Mass., July 29.—An unknown man who is alleged to have stolen a horse and wagon from the stables of George Adams was pursued by an angry mob through the streets of this village today, and when finally captured and placed in the lock-up, made an attempt to end his life by hanging. At a late hour tonight he had not recovered consciousness. Cards were found on his bearing the name "Alton Torsey, Saco, Maine."

When Mr. Adams found his horse and carriage gone from his stable, he started for the village in the hope of over-taking the thief, and when about to board an electric car near this town he met a man driving the stolen outfit. Adams recovered the equipment, but the man disappeared into the woods.

Mr. Adams was telling his story to an officer the man suddenly reappeared and the chase began. The culprit was driven into the cellar of William H. Kimball, where he hid under some planks. He was arrested by Officer Joseph St. George and taken to the lock-up, where a short time after he was found hanging, apparently lifeless, by a strip of his blanket, to an upper bar.

MURDERESS DIES AT CAYENNE.

Mrs. Vere St. Leger Gould Was Deported From Monte Carlo for Trunk Butchery.

FRANKFORT ON MAIN, July 29.—A despatch from Monte Carlo states that Mrs. Vere St. Leger Gould is dead at Cayenne, French Guiana, of typhoid fever.

Mrs. Gould and her husband under the titles of Sir Vere St. Leger Gould and Lady Gould, had lived at Monte Carlo in a villa for some time when they were arrested on August 6 of last year in the railroad station at Marseilles.

They were trying to ship to Paris a trunk containing the body of a woman, which turned out to be that of Emma Lovin, whom they had murdered in their villa at Monte Carlo for her jewels.

Gould subsequently confessed that he and his wife committed the murder and he sought to shoulder the burden of guilt, but on the trial the conclusion was reached that he had acted under the influence of his wife.

While she was condemned to death, the man was sentenced to imprisonment for life. On February 11, however, her sentence was commuted and she was set free.

CHAMBERLAIN'S HEALTH IN GRAVE CONDITION.

LONDON, July 29.—Joseph Chamberlain, who returned from the continent on Tuesday and is remaining in London for a few days on his way to Birmingham, is reported to be in a very grave condition. His eyesight has become seriously affected. Even if Mr. Chamberlain has sufficient strength to travel to Birmingham, it is believed to be extremely doubtful if he will ever leave England again.
