"A long-lived person may be distinguished from a short-lived person at sight. In many instances a physician may look at the hand of a patient and tell whether he or she will live or not. The primary conditions of longevity are that the heart, lungs and digestive organs, as well as the brain should be large. If these organs are large the trunk will be long and the limbs comparatively short. The person will appear all in sitting and short in standing. The hand will have a long and somewhat heavy palm and short fingers.

"The brain will be deeply seated, as shown by the orifice of the ear being low. The blue or brown hazel eye, as showing an intermission of temperament is a favorable indication. The nostrils, if large, open and free, indicate large lungs. A pinched and half closed nostril indicates small or weak lungs. These are general points of distinction but, of course, subject to the usual individual
