PRESBYTERIAN

Prof. J. W. Falconer, D.D., was the special preacher at the anniversary services held in St. Andrew's Church, St. John, last Sabbath. St. Andrew's Church dates its beginning back to the year 1784.

Rev. Hugh Miller, of Knox Church, Gloucester, N.S., has accepted the call extended to him by St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton, N.B., and will be inducted at an early date.

Rev. E. J. Kerr, who has filled appointments in several mission fields in New Brunswick, and who supplied in Harcourt, N.B., for last summer, is at present in Cranston, N.B.

Malcolm Ferguson, of the graduating class of Halifax College, has accepted a call to New Dublin and Congregational, N.S., in the Presbytery of Lunenburg and Yarmouth, and was ordained and inducted May 25. Revs. G. A. McKean, J. F. MacDonald, A. H. Campbell and Dr. A. M. Hill took part in the service.

Rev. Alex. Ferguson, of Strathalbyn, P.E.I., has accepted a call to the congregation of Little Narrows, C.B., in the Presbytery of Inverness, and will be inducted to the pastoral charge June 1.

Three of the recent graduates of Halifax Presbyterian College were ordained to the Christian ministry on the same date, May 27, each by a different Presbytery. Rev. D. E. Earle, of Passamaquoddy, N.B., was ordained and inducted to the charge of River Hebert, N.S., in the Presbytery of Wallace; D. A. McMillan to the congregation of Calvin Church, Louisburg, C.B., in the Presbytery of Sydney, and Ross Collins to Middleton, N.S., in the Presbytery of Halifax.

Rev. J. W. Smith, of Leitch Creek, N.S., has accepted a call to the congregation of Gabarus in the same Presbytery. Gabarus has been vacant since the removal of Rev. Malcolm Campbell, to Marsboro, P.Q., a year ago.

"Of the forty-five members of the Lady Normal-School Students' Bible Class in St. Paul's Church, Fredericton, N.B., twenty-five made a perfect attendance record, and two united with the church."—The Pathfinder.

The Young Men's Club of Deer Park Presbyterian Church, Toronto, with a membership of less than forty, supports a native missionary in Honan, China, as well as contributing \$45 towards the support of a home missionary in New Ontario.

The article entitled "Healing the Body Politic" from the pen of Principal John MacKay, of Westminster Hall, Vancouver, is being published in pamphlet form for general distribution. The article appeared in a recent number of the Westminster Magazine and spoke with no uncertain sound with the glaring evils of Canadian public life.

A Hero Indoned.

Rev. Frederick J. Paton, son of the late Dr. J. C. Paton, and well known in the Maritime Provinces, has yielded to others his own mission station on the island of Malekula, in the New Hebrides group, and goes alone to start a new station amongst the fierce hill tribes of North Malekula. In this district live the wildest cannibal tribes in the New Hebrides, and here recently six members of Dr. Sandiland's splendid native teaching staff were killed and eaten. And yet Mr. Paton faces them alone that he may win them to a better life by the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Truly all the heroes are not on the battlefields of Europe.

Well Known Words.

At a memorial service held in honor of the Canadian soldiers who had died on the field of the battle, Dr. J. W. Macmillan, one of the speakers in Halifax, May 9, said in the course of a singularly fine address: "Nothing is worth living for which is not worth dying for. A true mother will die, if necessary, for her children. A true doctor will not turn from a patient because his own life is in danger. A brave captain is the last to leave his vessel in the time of her wrecking. And the only patriotism worth having is one which loves its homeland to the death. War is always brutal. It is a kind of madness. It is homicidal mania on an international scale. But the soldier of a good cause is not to blame for the war. He fights, not because he wants to, but because he must. He hates war, but he hates something worse than war. He wants to live, but not at the price of slavery or dishonor."

New Pastor at Norton.

Norton is to be settled with a new minister. The Presbytery of St. John sustained a call to Rev. R. H. Staver, late of Harcourt, N.B. Mr. Staver accepted the call and will be inducted to the pastoral charge on the evening of May 31. Rev. F. W. Thompson, of St. John, has been appointed to preside and induct. Rev. T. Harrison will address the minister and Rev. T. P. Drummond the congregation. Congratulations are in order for both congregation and people, and the best wishes of the Presbytery and the Church generally, will be theirs in this prospective union.

A Wonderful Revival.

The First Church, Phoenixville, Philadelphia, Rev. Robert M. Green, pastor, recently passed through a most wonderful revival. In twelve weeks Dr. Green has preached every night and three times on Sundays. Great multitudes attended the services. On four Sunday evenings Dr. Green preached at seven to women only in the church and at eight o'clock to men only in the theatre, both places were crowded to such service. More than 2000 professed

conversion, 200 of whom have united with the Baptist church. Many of the converts joined other churches. The pastor has had no help aside from his loyal and devoted people. Twenty-five married couples and four or five families have been baptized. Two-thirds of the converts have been adults. More men have been baptized than women. Dr. Green has inaugurated a "follow up" system, in which every member of the church is being looked after by another. The origin of this work can be traced to the "every member" canvass, when a band of men and women set out to win lives, not money, to the Master's service.

Practical Christianity.

The Waltham Examiner says: "The First church, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, through its men's club, endeavors to find work and suitable remuneration for all members of the congregation who may apply to it for assistance. Three business men constitute the committee of the men's club. This is practical Christianity. If some such method were adopted everywhere it would go far toward solving the problem of unemployment among Christian people. It ought to be our greatest pleasure to help one another."

Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The enrollment for the past session at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary was 408, of whom 305 were men and 104 women. The men came from thirty-three States and seven foreign countries. Three states, Kentucky, North Carolina and Georgia, have more than thirty each, and Indiana has seventy-one. Every section of the country is represented from California and Oregon to New Jersey and New York, from Wisconsin to Florida, from Maryland to Texas and Arizona. One hundred and thirty-nine colleges are represented. The year has been one of the best in the history of the seminary.

A Model Financial System.

The Foxboro church, Massachusetts, Rev. George A. Francis pastor, has a financial system which is well studied. Formerly the church raised money for various purposes in all sorts of ways. But with the coming of Mr. Francis as pastor a new and unified system was adopted. There is but one treasurer. One pledge card covers all the church expenses and benevolences, and the congregation is promised that there will be no extra appeals nor special collections. By vote of the church a certain per cent. of the whole amount collected in the offerings is appropriated to various missionary purposes, and a check is sent every month, whether the pastor's salary and church expenses are paid or not. The pastor's salary comes next; and if there is any shortage it comes on the miscellaneous expenses of the church. But there is no shortage. The people are so satisfied to be relieved of a multitude of special appeals for all sorts of things that they have greatly increased their regular pledges, and everything is paid promptly and in full. The church sent the pastor to Philadelphia for a week to hear "Billy" Sunday, and he now has a vacation or six weeks and his expenses paid to the universities at Los Angeles. The spiritual features of the church work are also prospering greatly.—Waltham Examiner.

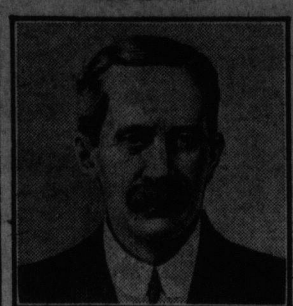

those gone forth. And the harvest will be God established in the hearts of living men. Not since the time of the martyrs has there been such faith as will be. Amen!"

In the Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church South this question is asked yearly on each circuit: "Has the sermon on the call to preach been preached?"

It is most important all preachers should be sure of the call of God. Devoted men are needed, educated and with heroism, akin to that which calls men to the battlefield to-day, but with a deeper stress.

In Flanders and France twenty-eight ministers of the Methodist Church are serving on the firing line as chaplains. Three in the East Mediterranean, and seven others were appointed in one week to serve the camps in the Home Land.

The British National Cabinet has a prominent Methodist in Mr. Arthur Henderson.

Mr. Reginald McKenna is also well known as the circuit steward of the West London Mission, King's Way, and a zealous worker in the interests

of humanity. Then Sir John A. Simon's forbears were Methodists.

The numerous friends of the Rev. Edward Bell, of Charlottetown, P.E.I., will regret to learn of his sudden death. He served the Church for over forty years faithfully and well. Since 1873 he travelled and labored on some of the largest circuits within the bounds of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference, and was everywhere esteemed and beloved.

From the Ranks.

The first authoritative announcement as to an appointment in the British National Cabinet, outside of Premier Asquith and Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary, is that of Arthur Henderson, a Labor leader, who succeeds Herbert Louis Samuel as President of the Local Government Board. The trades unionists are highly pleased at the appointment.

Mr. Henderson is a born leader of men and commands not only the confidence but the real affection of British workers. As a London Tory Journal once remarked of him: "He is the representative of labor in all that is best, in the right and responsible sense of the term."—High praise indeed for a man who began to earn his living before he was twelve years of age.

It was while working as a moulder in Newcastle-on-Tyne that Mr. Henderson first attracted attention as an orator and organizer, and he was always chosen by his fellowworkers to head their deputations. Mr. Henderson entered Parliament as a Labor member for the Barnard Castle division of Durham in 1903, and he has represented that constituency ever since. Few men have done more for the laboring class of Britain than he and his capacity for work has often amazed his colleagues. He is chairman of over a dozen labor committees, has sat on several Royal Commissions, is Secretary of the Labor Party outside Parliament, has worked indefatigably on the local councils of Durham and Darlington, of which latter place he was Mayor in 1903, and as a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church he has for many years been an active lay preacher and a representative at the annual conference.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The section, or any part thereof, of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency, on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land, each of three years.

Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may purchase a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, and cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
